

TWENTY SHIPPING MINES

In the Boundary District, B.C., and Three Smelters by January First Next Year.

A DIVIDEND ON ATHABASCA.

Good News Cabled From London Yesterday—Sales and Quotations on Mining Stocks.

TWENTY SHIPPING MINES

And Three Smelters—Boundary District Will Boast These by First of Year.

Greenwood, B.C., Sept. 18.—From information to hand from the different camps in the Boundary District, it is highly probable that by the first of January, 1901, there will be 20 steady shipping mines in the district. About the same period at least two, if not three, smelters should be in active operation. The outlook for the whole Boundary was never so bright as at present, and the dull times that for the past few months have worried miners are practically over. As one after another of the mines reaches the permanent shipping stage and stoping is commenced in earnest, the force of the market will be maintained and money is more freely circulated. It is in this period, the permanent shipping stage, when the actual results of a mine are known, that is being waited for on the outside, and as a mining man from Salt Lake tersely put it: "If the mines will 'stand up' capital will not be long in finding its way here."

Well, the present shippers seem to "stand up" so far as values are concerned, and from all reports there is plenty of ore to ship, so it is to be hoped that the demonstrated proof will hasten in capital for there are yet many promising properties that capital alone is necessary to turn into profit-paying mines.

In Summit Camp the B.C. mine shipments, it is expected, will reach 2000 tons for the present month. Superintendent G. F. Parrott reports progress being made in the connections between the Nos. 2 and 3 levels, where stoping is also going on. The main working shaft, now at a depth of 272 feet, is shortly to be continued on down. At the B. Bell, the development of which is in charge of Jack Hanly, the work of making connections between the level at the bottom of the 100-foot shaft and the tunnel, a distance of 115 feet above, is nearly completed. Superintendent Hanly yesterday informed the correspondent of The World that, this completed, ore bins would be built and the mine placed on a shipping basis by the middle of October.

In Deadwood Camp, besides the famous Mother Lode Mine, the following properties are being actively developed: The Morrison, Sunset, Crown Silver, Greyhound, Great Hope, Adirondack, Burns and Marguerite. Some time the coming week it is hoped to have ore shipments started from the big dump at the Mother Lode to the Greenwood smelter. From this it must not be understood that the local smelter is anywhere near ready to be blown in. Such a factory at Milwaukee will prevent the smelter being in operation before the first portion of December. With the machinery with the machinery manufacturers, the last of the plant should be ready by Oct. 25, and after its arrival it will take about two weeks to assemble the parts and install the same before operations at the smelter will be permitted. Excavation for foundations and clearing land is now in progress at the site selected by Andrew Laidlaw, who is to operate the smelter his company is about to build. The site is on Boundary Creek, immediately above the falls, about three miles below Greenwood. The contract for the machinery was let to the Denver Engineering Works Company on June 21 last and the building of the plant is well in progress. The plans and specifications for the different buildings are daily expected to arrive from Denver, and on their receipt building operations will be immediately started. With the machinery plant well advanced in its construction, Mr. Laidlaw hopes to have the smelter ready to blow in sometime in January.

Verdict for the Police.
George Toyns Failed in His Suit Against Detective Cuddy and His Help or Knowledge.
Before Mr. Justice Meredith and a jury, in the Civil Assize Court, yesterday afternoon, George Toyns, a Grand Trunk Railway employe, sued Detective Alfred Cuddy and Police Constable William Wallace to get \$5000 damages for alleged false arrest and imprisonment. Toyns was arrested at the Exhibition Grounds a year ago upon suspicion that he was a pickpocket. He was held at the Criminal Court, where a jury promptly acquitted him. The jury found that the arrest was justifiable, and returned a verdict for the defendants.
At the conclusion of the plaintiff's case, Judge Meredith withdrew from the jury the suit of B. P. Phillips, a horse-drover of 7 Dan. Mr. P. T. Vernal will sue a wool merchant against the Grand Trunk Railway for \$2000 damages. Phillips was employed by J. B. Hogate of Toronto last February to look after a valuable horse that was being shipped to Durham. 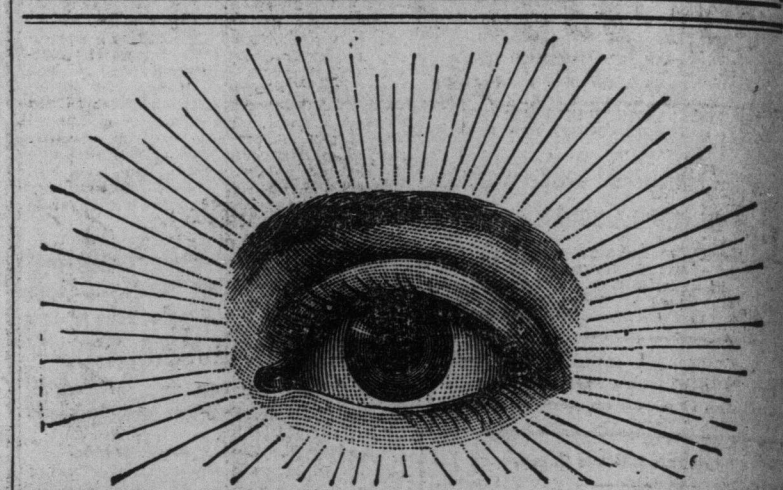
