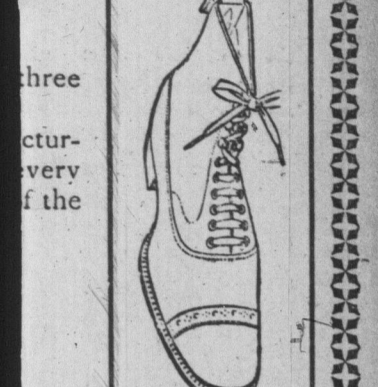

TWENTY-SECOND YEAR

King Shows His Interest. Telegraphs a Welcome to the Delegates to the British Congress of Tuberculosis.

GIFT FOR FIRST PUBLIC SANITARIUM.

Duke of Cambridge Presiding, Announces That £120,000 Will Be Forthcoming for This Object.

London, July 22.—The British Congress of Tuberculosis for the Prevention of Consumption, was opened to-day by Field Marshal H.R.H. the Duke of Cambridge, president of the congress, who welcomed the foreign delegates and spoke of the interest taken in the congress by King Edward.

Lord Lansdowne, the Foreign Secretary, also welcomed the delegates, and in the name of the government promised all the assistance the government was able to afford the congress in its endeavors to combat a disease more devastating than war.

Prevention and Cure. After the Lord Mayor of London, Frank Green, Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal and others had addressed the congress, Lord Lansdowne, one of the British vice-presidents of the congress, in a few words conveyed the thanks of that body to Prof. Robert Koch of Germany and the other scientists present for their welcome, saying they knew the energy they had to deal with, but it was not only the prevention but the cure of consumption that the congress hoped to effect.

King's Interest. A telegram was read from King Edward to the Duke of Cambridge, as follows: "I pray you heartily to welcome for me the eminent men of almost every nation who have assembled under your presidency and to express to them my earnest hope that the result of the deliberations of the congress will be to effect the cure of consumption, the most distressing and most dreaded of diseases."

Prior to the adjournment of to-day's session of the congress, the Duke of Cambridge announced that a gift of £120,000 would be forthcoming for the purpose of establishing the first public tuberculosis sanitarium at home as the recommendations of the congress concerning its establishment had been formulated.

Canadians There. Four hundred foreign delegates attended to-day's opening session. They included a number of Americans and Canadians. Several ambassadors and foreign ministers, including Joseph H. Choate, American ambassador, also were present.

SHOTS WERE EXCHANGED. Woodstock Police Man Had a Long Chase for Alleged Burglar.

Woodstock, July 22.—Police man Johnson had an exciting chase after a pair of burglar suspects on Saturday evening, and effected the arrest of Dickson, of London and William Morgan of Woodstock behind the bars. After the arrest of Thomas Dalton on Saturday morning by Night Watchman Anderson, the police have been looking for Dalton's companion, who got away from Anderson's grasp.

Forest Fires in Kippewa District. Ottawa, July 22.—The heaviest and most extensive forest fires on record were those which raged this month in the Kippewa District. A gentleman familiar with the situation, stated to-day that the loss would at least total \$500,000, and would probably run much higher. Heavy rains on Wednesday and Friday stopped the progress of the fire. It has yet to be ascertained whether the fire had been extinguished or not.

Convict's Suicide. Stony Mountain, Man., July 22.—(Special.)—A Gallian named Wasey Achymiz, who was sentenced a couple of months ago to two years imprisonment for attempting to shoot a woman and after leaving the court room struck the woman and was given three years in addition to his sentence for contempt of court, committed suicide in his cell in the Penitentiary. When discovered he was hanging from a beam in the cell.
