CHARGED WITH VIOLATING CRIMINAL CODE

president Charles F. Sise of the Bell Telephone Company Summoned to Appear Before Magistrate Davidson at Whitevale for Trial Next Monday.

Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, President of the C.P.R., Subpænaed as a Witness-Climax of Struggle Waged Against Telephone Monopoly in Ontario County.

Whitevale, Feb. 16—(Special.)—Chas. F. Sise, president of the Bell Telephone Company of Canada, was formally charged with the violation of the criminal law to-day, and a summons issued, commanding him to appear for trial next Monday This is the climax of the contest that has been waged for several weeks by the rural districts of Ontario County against the Bell monopoly with so much determination. The summons was sent by registered letter to Montreal. This is the first step of the Crown in the case, which promises to become celebrated in This is the summons directed to Canadian jurisprudence. The penalty President Sise; is not less than \$1000 nor more than

\$10,000. The complaint was filed with Magistrate James Davidson. It was formally sworn to by a member of the Cooperative Company, and dozens of prominent farmers from all parts of the county were present to witness the inauguration of the proceedings by the Crown. That the criminal law should be invoked under the circumstances was inevitable after President Sise and his forces had Boasted of their exclusive contract with the railreads of Canada, even when confronted with a clear section of the criminal code prohibiting such a combination.




