CHARGED WITH VIOLATING CRIMINAL CODE

President Charles F. Sise of the Bell Telephone Company Summoned to Appear Before Magistrate Davidson at Whitevale for Trial Next Monday.

Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, President of the C.P.R., Subpoenaed as a Witness—Climax of Struggle Waged Against Telephone Monopoly in Ontario County.

Whitevale, Feb. 16.—(Special.)—Charles F. Sise, president of the Bell Telephone Company of Canada, was formally charged with the violation of the criminal law today.

The complaint was filed with Magistrate James Davidson. It was formally sworn to by a member of the Co-operative Company, and dozens of prominent farmers on all parts of the county were present to witness the inauguration of the proceedings by the Crown.

Many Witnesses to Come. As soon as the complaint was sworn to, Magistrate Davidson certified subpoenas for a large number of witnesses, which were at once handed to his constable for service.

Formal Complaint. Here is the formal complaint the Bell Telephone President must answer to. Now comes Herbert J. Hurd, who says: That Charles F. Sise of Montreal, as president of the Bell Telephone, Limited, of Canada, on or about the 22nd day of February, 1903, in the County of Ontario, for and on behalf of said company, did unlawfully conspire, agree or arrange with the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, to unlawfully limit the facilities for transporting or supplying or dealing in articles and commodities, subjects of trade and commerce, to wit, ordinary farm and other produce, by refusing telephone connection and privileges to one Harrison Johnston and others, contrary to the provisions of the Criminal Code, Section 520.

What Will Sise Do? Much speculation is being indulged in thru the county as to the attitude Mr. Sise will assume in the trial.

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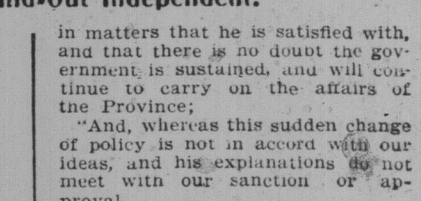
