Mr. Wood Asks to Have Suit Against Companies Brought Before Jury.

Alfred Wood, proprietor of The Otawa Free Press, appeared before Atorney-General Gibson yesterday morning and asked for a flat to permit an dictment to be laid against certain insurance companies in Canada who had, it was claimed, committed a breach of section 520 of the Criminal Code by combining to fix what is known to the public as the insurance tariff. G. M. Kelley of Cassels, Cassels & Brock appeared with Mr. Wood, and the Canadian Fire Underwriters' Association was defended by Leighton McCarthy, K.C., M.P., and C. S. Mc-

Innes.

In opening the case Mr. Kelley stated that Mr. Wood as a property owner of Ottawa, was now compelled to pay an almost prohibitive rate of \$2.25 per annum for insurance, that formerly had cost 90 cents; that this increase companies doing business in Canada to fix a uniform rate applicable to Ottawa in contravention of the law which states that any corporation which arranges with any other person to unduly prevent or lessen competition on the price of insurance on petition which arranges with any other personal competition. to a fine not exceeding \$10,000.

Judge's Opinon.

Mr. Wood had endeavored to bring the case to a speedy trial, but Mr. Justice MacMahon in Ottawa decided derwriters it was denied that any agreement had been made between the companies interested to fix rates, and it was claimed that the rate complaincontention was that the question of fairness was one to be decided by a jury, upon a full presentation of the evidence, and that it was an injustice to him to have this matter decided upon incomplete and inaccurate statements in argument before the Attorney-General.

Mr. McCarthy then contended that the matter should be referred to a judge for decision whether the Attorney-General could issue such a flat.

Mr. Wood explained that the five companies outside the combine were young companies, and they might be likened to apprentices who were not eligible for membership in the union, but who, by strictly conforming to its rulings, hoped to gain admittance, and who, in the meantime, profited by the association's acime, profited by the association's ac-
