\$57,300 is Sum Asked.

London citizens will be asked next week to contribute the sum of \$57,300 to extend the accommodation at the Queen Alexandra Sanatorium, so that 150 returned soldiers may be treated at 150 returned soldiers may be treated at one time. That is a small sum, after all, when it is considered that it means

all, when it is a small sum, after all, when it is considered that it means the restoration to health and usefulness of scores and scores of men who without it would have small chance of life. The investment that is made in the sanatorium will pay dividends of hundreds per cent in the work that men saved by its agency will perform in years to come.

The central committee has prepared a careful statement of the expenditure which must be made in order to bring the sanatorium to the required capacity. The chief expenditure 13, of course, the permanent building for bed cases accommodating 85 patients, equipped with X-ray plant, bacteriological laboratory and small overating room. Furnished complete this will cost \$145,000, and towards this there have already been grants of \$25,000 each from the Military Hamiltand.



An equal amount will have to be spent in doubling the izundry capacity, while water supply and drains will take \$4,400, and grading and roads will require \$2,000. The total expenditure is \$174,800, for which grants of \$97,000 have already been received or promised. This leaves a balance of \$77,300, of which Sir Adam Beck has promised to raise \$20,000 in the surrounding district, and London is asked to provide the balance, \$57,300. As this is less than one-third of the total cost of the enlarged plant, the demand cannot be regarded as heavy, and there are already indications that the amount asked for will be far exceeded.


