



# May Lose Their Harborage.

London, June 3.—The desperate atu tempt on the lives of King Alfonso and Queen Victoria closely touches the people of Great Britain, bringing home to them the question of harboring anarchists which has long been kept n the background.

It is now expected that this will immediately be presented to the Government upon the reassembling of Parliament after the Whitsuntide recess, when an effort will be made to secure the passage of a law excluding anarchists from their long-enjoyed harborage in Great Britain.
