EGGS DROP TO 42 C. ON MARKET TODAY

Wholesale Price Down to 38 Cents a Dozen.

NEW YORK, April 12.—The close of the first week of the third Liberty Loan campaign today found the New York market for eggs at a low level. The weekly average of the past week was 42 cents a dozen, but the daily average for the week ended today was 38 cents a dozen.
