MACKLEM PLEADS

Refuses Offer to Make Restitution—Is Released on Personal Bond.

plea of "not guilty." The case was
adjourned until Monday in order to

Macklem's sister offered to make restitution for the alleged forged check, but he refused to permit her to do this, declaring he was innocent of any wrongdoing.

Macklem was released by Justice Stein on his personal bond. He says that by Monday cablegrams from England will establish his right to the title of "colonel."

Cadorna Selects Tortuous River Along Which To Halt Teuton Invasion—Italy's Troops Regain Old Spirit, Retiring In Good Order --- Gallant Feat of Grenadiers--- Rear Guard Stops Rushes of Austrians---War Zone Is Extended.

Rome, Nov. 7 .- The Italians have withdrawn in good order from the Tagliamento River toward the Livenza, it is announced officially.

The Livenza is the next river line behind the Tagliamento, Its mouth is 12 miles below that of the Tagliamento. Its mouth is 12 miles below that of the Tagliamento. Its course is tortuous, and it has been generally assumed that General Cadorna would undertake nothing more than a delaying action there, making his stand along a more favorable line, such as that of the Plave River.
