This Is Belief Expressed by Local Butcher On Hold-Up of Licenses.

LITTLE EFFECT NOW

Apparent Desire to Keep Out Substitute Until After Election Holds Price Up.

Unless the much advertised butter substitute, oleomargarine, appears for sale in Canada within the next thre weeks, it is predicted by local dealers that butter will reach its top winter price, which will be around the 60c per

pound mark.

If the provisions of the order-incouncil allowing the importation and
sale of oleo had been carried out at
the time of the Government sanction
of the law, it is certain, say these
dealers, that butter would have remained stationary and that present
prices would have ranged from 38c to
40c. Two weeks ago, when local butchers and cold storage man weeks and cold storage men were questioned on the probability of being able to purchase oleo in this city before December 1, they expressed the opinion that unless the food controller expedited its sale the advent of margarine into the country would be of the

that unless the food controller expedited its sale the advent of margarine into the country would be of little benefit to Canadians.

"The order-in-council allowing the sale of oleomargarine was passed with the object of reducing butter prices," a local cold storage man said. "The effect of margarine on butter would not be evidenced until a month or so after the coming of oleo into the country. If margarine had been allowed importation one month ago, today we could have obtained butter at 40c per pound. As it is, the present high price of butter will remain unchanged for the next few weeks, and unless oleo appears in the meantime prices will ascend as high as 60c and 70c."

Since it was announced that an order-in-council had been passed allowing the sale and manufacture of oleo in the country, the granting of licenses governing its sale has been postponed several times. Prospective dealers in oleo received word some days ago that the butter substitute will come into the country on December 10. One butcher in the city expressed the belief that margarine would not be allowed importation until after the election, owing to the Government fear of the antagonism which such a move would create among farmers.

Second of Interesting Series Given on Monday Night in Public Library.

The personalities of the men who joined hands fifty years ago to bring together the provinces into one Dominion were sketched last night by Public Librarian Fred Landon, in the second of the series of university extention lectures being held in the public library. The chair was taken by Principal G. F. Rogers of the Collegiate Institute.

The lecturer pointed out that The lecturer pointed out that in English-speaking countries at least it was the custom to abuse and run down politicians individually and as a class. Those who would eulogize the Fathers of Confederation must remember that they too in their own day were politicians, and some of them regarded as of a pretty sharp type. There were thus the various stages by which a politician developed into a statesman and later into a father of his country. The special merit of these men was that at a critical time they all set themselves to a definite task, and didn't let go until they had accomplished it. Then they went back to party quarreling. Macdonald and Brown, who had not spoken to each other for ten years, came together on union, carried it through, and afterwards were as bad friends as ever in their lives.

The very great part that was played by Cartier in leading the French-Canadians was one of the interesting features of the address, in view of the attitude taken by French Canada today. Cartier possessed great influence in Quebec, and both Macdonald and Tupper had testified that without his help confederation could never have been accomplished. The part played by Macdonald and Brown was well brought out. Macdonald was, after all, the great factor in the carrying on of the union government. His hold on men was greater than that of any of his contemporaries, and his place in the public life of Canada was well shown by the fact that for 23 years after confederation he was the greatest political figure in the country. The human side of Macdonald was set forth, that combination of rare qualities which made his followers ready to go through fire and water for him.

Confederation, as accomplished by this group of men who gathered from all the provinces, had changed the character of half a continent, and had set an example that other Britfsh dominions had since followed. The The very great part that was played

The adaptability of British constitutional government to other and newer lands had been proven, and it had been shown that self-government did not diminish, but increased attachment to the motherland.

Principal Rogers, in introducing the speaker, commended warmly the idea of extension lectures. He believed that the university was fulfilling a real duty to the community by arranging such evenings.

NORMAL SCHOOL MUST TRY AGAIN

Local Students Have Te Rewrite Equivalent of Lower School Exams.

It is announced today that 235 students at the Normal School will write on examinations at Christmas equivalent to the Lower School exams, of the high schools.

"About 235 students at the Normal will write on these examinations," said Dr. S. J. Radcliffe, the principal. "A few will escape on account of attending the Normal last year. I warned the students early in September, that they might expect this, and I think the majority are working hard on the subjects in question to prepare themselves properly."
