KEEPING COW RECORDS BEGAN IN TILLSONBURG

G. D. Tillson Originated System Now
In General Use in Dairies.

TILLSONBURG, April 23.—The system of keeping dairy records and testing of milk has now become a most important work on a dairy farm, for the fact that very few farmers who do not keep records can tell exactly which is the best cow they have in their herd.

Many people, however, who have been using the system fail to realize that it originated in the town of Tillsonburg with the late E. D. Tillson of Annandale

farm, who had a herd of some 65 dairy cows, mostly of Holstein grades, and who brought his average production up to somewhere in the neighborhood of 12,000 pounds per cow, one cow alone producing 24,000 pounds.

This was considered such strong evidence of the value of keeping records that the system was adopted by all experimental farms and agricultural colleges.

MAY BUILD SUBWAY.
Despite the civic injunction to postpone all public works here, the works board will ask the city council for permission to construct the St. Paul's avenue subway, for which \$40,000 was voted two years ago by the ratepayers. A local contracting firm has offered to accept civic debentures in lieu of payment, thereby expediting the financial side of the proposition.

DOCTORS WILL HELP.

The local firm is already getting ready to start work on the pavement from the city out to Cainsville. At a meeting of the ratepayers of Cainsville tonight the 30-foot pavement was adopted, and the 50-foot pavement will be adopted.

STRODE JAUNTILY INTO COURT WEARING A WHITE CARNATION

Dennis Vallee, Beachville
Postmaster, Is Charged
With Bigamy.

WOODSTOCK, April 23.—With a large white carnation gaily adorning his buttonhole, Dennis Vallee, former postmaster of Beachville, strode jauntily and unconcerned into police court this morning to answer a charge of bigamy. Vallee, early on the morning of April 13, accompanied by Clara Canfield, with whom it is said he went through a form of marriage in Kingston, although he had a wife in Beachville, took a hurried departure from Beachville. Later the couple were arrested in Kingston, and Vallee has been in jail ever since. He did not plead or elect trial, but told the court he was negotiating with a local lawyer to defend him, and on these grounds the magistrate remanded him till May 3.

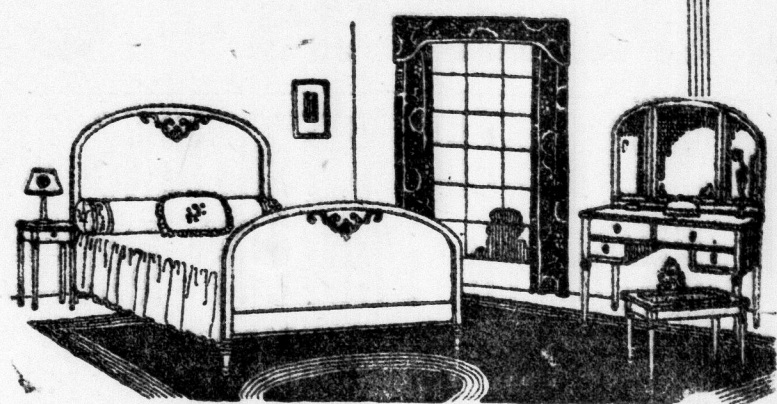

ST. GEORGE'S DAY AND SEMI-CENTENNIAL OF CHURCH CELEBRATED

Banquet and Services Commemorate the Double Occasion at Stratford.

STRATFORD, April 23.—St. George's Day was fittingly observed at St. James' Church, when Canon Fotheringham of Brantford addressed a large gathering at a banquet. The banquet also opened a three-day semi-centennial celebration of the erection of the present handsome edifice in 1870. On Sunday Bishop Williams of London, rector from 1892 to 1905, will preach, and on Monday the young people's society will present scenes of early days in Stratford's history.

Gas in Waterloo is now selling for \$1.30 per 1,000 feet, and the commission did not deem it necessary to increase the price, as they are able to finance at the present rate.
