Nevertheless, there is likely to be considerable grain . ready to come out because of the fact that no export trade went on during the war. and because the actual consumption within Russia has decreased since

Speaking generally, Russia's exsources that has remained largely will be handicapped by the lack of transportation facilities, it is expected to grow rapidly. Cotton, flax and hemp are other commodities of which there are large stocks that can be exported. The factories of Russia have been working so slowly since the revolution that they have not begun to absorb the stocks of these raw materials that were produced. It is stated that the Russian cotton factories (excluding those of Poland and the Baltic provinces) are today producing only six per cent of what they were producing before the war. In the warehouses of Turkestan there are eight million poods of cotton today with a yearly surplus of two millions in Turkestan, and an annual consumption by the Russian mills of but three million poods. An export of five million poods would still leave a three years' supply.

The Russian linen industry stated to be in a healthier condition than the cotton industry, although only running at 40 per cent capacity. The fact that the raw material is produced close to the mills accounts for the greater activity in this industry. Before the war the Russian linen factories consumed three million poods of flax per annum, while now they are using just over a million poods yearly. There is thus a surplus available for export, even should there be a revival of the linen industry.


