He walked all night and most of the day without food or sleep. Returning to his sister's house, 647 St. Charles-avenue, he read in the evening papers the account of a young woman having wandered into the police station, and made haste to reach her.

COBOURG, Aug. 21.—(Special.)—In a blaze of sunshine and amid salvos of applause from 5000 spectators, Cobourg's great horse show was closed this evening with the presentation of a gold cup to Mrs. Jas. Murray, Toronto, whose famous bay, "The Wasp," was adjudged the highest number of points, entitling him to the championship of the show. This horse holds the highest record of any horse in the world for jumping without a tight pole. His highest jump to-day was 7 feet.
