ourg's great horse show was closed

this evening with the presentation of

a gold cup to Mrs. Jas. Murray, To-

ronto, whose famous bay, "The Wasp,"

was adjudged the highest number of

points, entitling him to the champion-

ship of the show. This horse holds

the highest record of any horse in

the world for jumping without a tight

ship of the show. His highest jump to-day was

7 feet.
