Another Plot Against England Uncovered In New York; Two Arrests

Invasion Of India By Way Of China

He is Now on Ship With Von Bernstorff on Way Home — Had Paid Visit to Berlin and Returned to New York — A Prominent Chinese in the Plot

New York, March 6.—Dr. C. Hanard Chaklaby, a Hindu physician, and Dr. Ernest Schkummer, aged thirty-four, described as a German, were arrested today on charges of conspiring to set up a military expedition against a foreign country on friendly relations with the United States.

After the literature was prepared, according to the police, Chaklaby and Schkummer employed as their agent an influential Chinese whom they sent to his native country with the idea of interesting his government in a plan to ship arms and ammunition from the United States to China...

Wilson Wants To Arm The Merchant Ships

Final Decision on Legality Expected Soon—Perhaps Other Means—What London Papers Think of President's Inaugural

Washington, Mar. 6.—President Wilson, it was said authoritatively today, will do everything possible to find a way to arm American ships and protect them in other ways from submarine danger...

In deciding on the legal status of the question, it was learned, the president and his cabinet are conferring the intent of the old statute passed in 1915, which was cited in the senate as prohibiting the arming of merchantmen for action against armed public vessels of nations in amity with the United States.
