

MAJORITY PARTIES IN REICHSTAG TO STAND BY PROGRAMME

Berlin, Oct. 13, via London, Oct. 15—
Matthias Erzberger, leader of the Centerist party in the Reichstag, which has demanded greater deference to that body from the government, told the Associated Press today that recent developments would not interfere with the majority parties' peace attitude as based on the resolution of July 10, or in any way retard the movement for parliamentarization. If anything, he asserted, the latter will be accelerated as the result of the government's predicament. He asserted that the majority bloc, now made up of Socialists, Centerists and Progressives, continues to present a solid plan behind the issues for which it stands, and that it is not improbable it will be augmented by substantial support from the National Liberals in connection with some of the more pertinent issues growing out of the present situation. Even without that support the coalition would have an ample working majority.

The premier is expected back on October 22, after his trip to the Near East, and it is assumed he will confer with the factional leaders of the Reichstag.

Washington, Oct. 15—President Wilson, in behalf of the liberty loan, last night, issued a proclamation setting aside October 24 as liberty day, and urging the people of the nation to assemble on that day in their respective communities and "pledge to one another and to the government that represents them the fullest measure of financial support.

"Let the result be so impressive and emphatic," the president urges, "that it will echo throughout the empire of the enemy as an index of what America intends to do to bring this war to a victorious conclusion."

A COMPLAINT ABOUT THE PATRIOTIC FUND AND AN EXPLANATION

Washington, Oct. 15—Aroused by publication of private cablegrams announcing arrival of American troops in France, the war and navy departments today took steps to prevent a repetition of the incidents, which may result in the courtmarshal of the officers who sent the messages.

In one case a former national guard officer wired his governor of the arrival of the state's troops, but so far as is known here newspapers in that locality observed the government's voluntary censorship request and did not print the cable.

In the other case, however, a former national guard officer telegraphed the governor of his state of the arrival of his regiment with a request that it be given fullest publicity. The governor's office gave out the cablegram and many papers in that section printed the news. This morning other newspapers published the despatch and added a number and designation of the regiment, all in violation of the voluntary censorship.


