ALL CANADA ALSO SHOWS GAIN IS MADE

Crops Value Estimate of \$74,194,000 Is Somewhat Lower

NEW BRUNSWICK led the whole of the Dominion in the average yield of potatoes per acre this season, according to a report which has just been issued by the agricultural division of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics at Ottawa. New Brunswick's yield reached the high figure of 142.5 hundredweight to the acre, the closest competitor being Prince Edward Island
