

SAYS GERMANY MAKES MISTAKE

Monarchist Party Leader
Against Joining League
of Nations

Declares Much Taken Away and
Nothing Gained For His
Country

BERLIN, March 5.—(United Press).—I consider Germany's entry into the League a misfortune, because it involves the sacrifice of the last vestige of German independence—notably the forfeiture of a sovereign foreign policy.

Germany's adherence to the league means that Germany is bound, body and soul, to the political and economic policy of the western nations. For the league of nations is not a league of peoples, but rather a union of the signatory powers of Versailles, come to-

gether to maintain the status which the Versailles treaty imposed upon Europe.

Once in the league, Germany will find herself thwarted in every attempt to form strong connections with the East. And Germany's salvation and chances of regaining freedom depends entirely upon the formation of such link with the Near and Far East.

I and my political friends are not bolsheviks. But we contend that, Germany and Russia belong together, politically and economically. I am convinced that western capitalism renders Germany's liberation impossible. But it is this very western capitalism which finds its outlet in the League of Nations.

WALL STREET.

Although the United States are not represented in the league, Wall Street controls the league. This explains why American opinion favors Germany's entry into the league. But this is also an additional reason for those Germans who share my desire for the social emancipation of the German people to oppose this country's adherence to the league.

Having entered the league, according to the league's covenant, Germany can expect credits which ultimately be forced to break off her relations with Turkey or Russia or some other eastern nation—or even proclaim war against such a nation—if the league so decides. Nothing is changed by the Locarno formula regarding Article XVI of the league's covenant. Germany will violate her own interests and become the pawn of western capitalism.

Germany from opposing effectively the miserable treatment of German minorities in Europe.

In a nutshell: The league takes much away from Germany; in return, the league gives Germany—phrases. And perhaps, in addition to phrases, we can expect credits which ultimately mean only the enslavement of German industry and agriculture.

556,711 TOURISTS VISIT B. C. IN YEAR

Motor Traffic to Pacific
Province Gains With
Road Expansion

VICTORIA, B. C., March 4.—Almost as many people as the entire population of British Columbia came to the province last year in automobiles from outside points, according to government figures compiled here.

Altogether 106,176 foreign cars entered British Columbia last year through 19 points of entry which have so far returned their figures. These cars brought 556,711 passengers, while in the previous year 75,061 foreign cars with 404,405 passengers came to the province.

The growth in motor traffic to and from the province has more than kept pace with the expansion of the highway system, although the government's road program is extensive. The road mileage of the province outside municipal roads, has increased almost 50 per cent in nine years, and now aggregates 17,020 miles. The province's investment in roads, bridges and ferries totals \$85,000,000.

Halifax Port To Be Tested By White Star

HALIFAX, N. S., March 4.—Col. A. W. Jones, of A. G. Jones and Company, local agents for the White Star line, announced today that it had been decided that the Plymouth, leaving Liverpool, April 3, would make Halifax its terminus. The liner, it was stated, would not call at any other port on this side of the Atlantic.

The object of the "experiment," it is understood, is to test the advantages and facilities of this port as a terminus for Atlantic liners.

MONTREAL COLLEGE BATTLE IMPENDING

United Church Adherents
Won't Give Up Char-
ter of School

MONTREAL, March 4.—Presbyterians who joined the United Church will not surrender the charter of the Presbyterian College.

They will give up the college building, but rather than give up the charter, they will withdraw the bill now before the provincial legislature.

This was the ultimatum given out at a special meeting of the Church Union Committee and the Presbyterian College Board summoned today, to consider the situation created by the legislature's decision yesterday to hand over to the Continuing Presbyterians the college building and the Presbyterian College charter.

LECTURE ON WALES

CRAWLS IN SNOW

Dr. I. I. Richmond told Judge Chamberlain how the mother had allowed an eight-year-old girl, suffering from a severe heart ailment, to crawl on her hands and knees in the snow to the home of her father, three-quarters of a mile away. 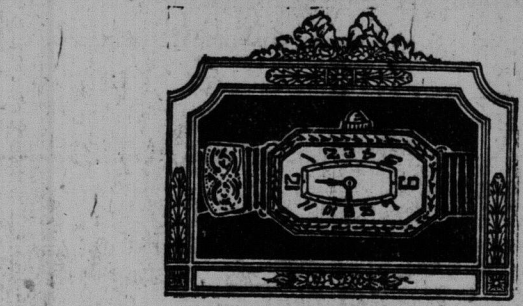

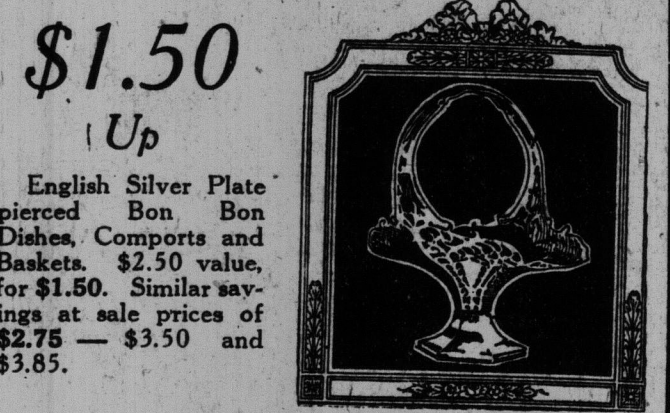
