

LOCAL NEWS

The Laborers' Protective Union last night in Charlottetown passed a resolution for sale of beer containing not less than five per cent of alcohol.

An automobile owned by Dr. Edward J. Bragdon was stopped before the doctor's house last night, but the brakes slipped and the car rolled across Union street and down Chipman Hill, bringing up against the curb with minor damages.

Detective Donahue yesterday placed two boys under arrest on the charge of stealing a watch from John Galles, 28 North street. In court the two pleaded guilty, but did not have the watch, having sold it to a man for \$1.50.

Major Victor Heron who has been general staff officer at local headquarters since his return from the front left for Washington last evening where he will become military attaché to the British embassy at that place. The position is regarded by military men here as a highly important one and Major Heron is to be congratulated on his appointment.

Unfavorable news for the sugar refiners of this city and Halifax was received yesterday by Secretary R. E. Armstrong, of the board of trade, in a lengthy communication from the board of railway commissioners. The commissioners announced that in fifteen days an order, No. 1888, previously adopted by order-in-council, will be put into effect, which means that railway freight rates on sugar refined in the cities named will be increased all the way from fifty to 104 per cent. The restoration of this order does away with commodity rates and re-establishes class rates, placing sugar refiners products in the fifth tariff class.

EVANGELISTIC SERVICES

United evangelistic services among the Carleton Methodists, the Ludlow street Baptist and the Charlotte street United Baptist churches have been fully arranged for and the first service was held in the Charlotte street church last night, where all the services will be held this week.

There was a considerable congregation and the service opened with a bright song service conducted by George W. Mott, of the Charlotte street church. The speaker was Rev. E. A. Westerland, who, taking no particular text, read from the Prophet Isaiah and the Acts of the Apostles and went on to point out the confusion, which exists in the social and industrial life of the world today, referring to the Bolshevism in Russia and Hungary. He described the industrial unrest in Britain and told of unsettled conditions in Canada and in New Brunswick, remarking particularly to the potato scandal.

He contrasted the days of the past and those of the present, when the old family altars are broken down and the voices of their parents raised in prayer are not heard by the children. Mr. Westerland suggested that the remedy of all this unrest could be found in the divine Power, that Power which is in the beginning, brooding over the spirit of chaos and darkness and brought from it law and order.

MAINE TO TRAIN RURAL TEACHERS

Skowhegan, Maine, March 25—A measure has just passed the Maine Legislature that promises to place the rural schools on a much higher plane of efficiency and the plan will be watched by many other states in the Union. Under the provisions of the new law, which was proposed by the state superintendent, Augustus O. Thomas, he will arrange for a special school of instruction during the summer months for local rural teachers, and teachers so trained shall agree to return to the service of the towns from which they are chosen for a least one year, during which time they shall act as rural critic and helping teacher. For the present year there are approximately 80,000.

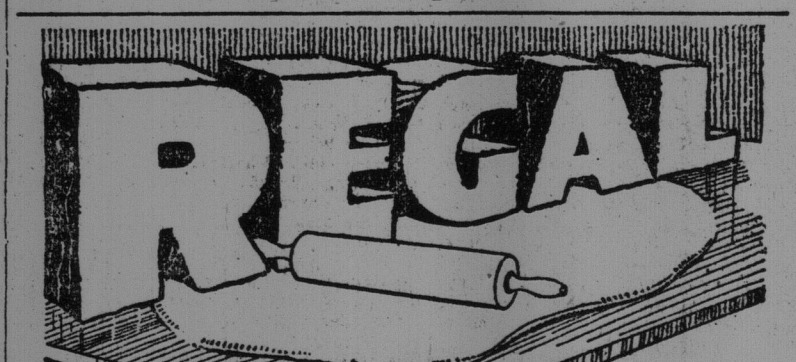

TRAVEL COST FOR MOTORIST

Depends on Size of Automobile and Number of People it Carries

(Toronto Globe.)

It is quite understandable that at the present time motorists, and would-be converts to the pastime, look most closely at the cost of traveling. Consequently, the buyer in making his or her decision as to what type of motor vehicle to purchase takes the probable cost as the first item of consideration. It is always difficult to actually state that motoring should cost such-and-such a sum annually, as there are so many points to be considered. Laying aside, however, all "entertaining" costs, the cost resolves itself into the mileage covered each year. Seven thousand miles is probably the shortest distance per annum that anyone who is fond of motoring covers, as this represents something less than 135 miles a week. Taking this figure as a basis of cost, the solo motorcyclist's expenditure will work out at about two cents a mile, the side-car owner will spend about three cents per mile, the light car will cost about six cents per mile, and the larger car owner must be prepared to spend up to twenty-five cents a mile, according to the size and carrying capacity of the machine. The last item plays an important part in costs as the more carried the greater the expenditure on fuel, tires and wear and tear on the whole machine. Few motorists keep an accurate account of what they spend in this direction, but the above figures are as near as the minimum expenditure as it is possible to give and be relied upon. Putting the figures into dollars and cents, the motorcyclist will spend on tires, gasoline, oil, repairs, renewals, garage, etc., about \$100 for every 7,000 miles traveled. The light car owner will spend about \$150 for the same distance, the light car proprietor about \$200, and the heavy motor car owner from \$400 to the chauffeur-driven car-de-luxe cost of about \$1,700 per annum.

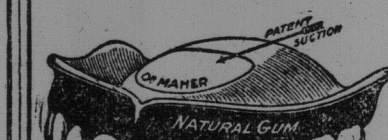

CHICAGO'S VICTORY AGAINST DISEASE

That no city in America faces sanitary problems too difficult to be solved is demonstrated in the victory which Chicago has scored in its combat with the typhoid death rate. It was a fight which necessitated changing the course of a river and causing it to flow southward into the Gulf of Mexico, instead of northeastward into the Gulf of St. Lawrence, as nature directed.

The story of this battle with bacilli as waged by the Windy City is told by William Joseph Showalter in an article on Chicago Today and Tomorrow, in the current number of the National Geographic Magazine, which says in part:

"Long ago Chicago discovered that if it were not to develop into a hub of typhoid fever and other diseases of the intestinal tract it would have to devise a way of keeping the water of the lake from pollution. A mounting typhoid rate, making the city more nearly a pest-hole than a proper habitation for man, demonstrated that it could not continue to mix sewage with drinking water by draining the sewers into the lake.

"So heroic measures were taken to end the pollution. The Chicago river was made to give up an age-long right to contribute its water to the St. Lawrence, and was made to flow across the divide separating the Great Lakes from the Mississippi river. Thus waters that normally ran into the Gulf of St. Lawrence were dispatched into the Gulf of Mexico and made to carry the burden of Chicago's sewage as they went.

"This was accomplished by the construction of a drainage canal thirty-six miles long, from the south branch of the Chicago river to the Illinois river at Joliet. This waterway, twenty-four feet deep and sixty-four feet wide in rock and 202 in earth, has a fall of forty feet. It serves the triple purpose of drainage, navigation and power development. Its construction was begun in the World's Fair year and cost nearly \$70,000,000. It was built larger than the requirements of the hour for drainage, and sooner or later will form a part of the waterway that will permit river steamers to pass between the lakes and gulf.

"When the state legislation authorizing the canal was passed, a provision was incorporated providing that, in order to prevent the sewage from becoming a nuisance and a menace to the country through which the canal passes, there should be a flow of 383.3 cubic feet per second for every hundred thousand people. Realizing that the population would probably reach three million by 1930 the city provided for a flow of 10,000 feet per second, with an ultimate capacity of 14,000 feet.

"But the secretary of war, under his control of navigable waters, stepped in and fixed the flow at 5,000. Later, when the question of whether or not Chicago was between the devil and the deep sea of federal order.

"Although pointing out that Lake Michigan was higher in the ten years following the opening of the canal than in the ten preceding, and although showing that it was higher by fifteen inches in January, 1917, than it was in January, 1916 and further, that it was higher in 1916 than it had been in any January since 1876, the sanitary district authorities were unable to convince the secretary of war.

"A friendly suit, which is still pending, was brought in the federal courts to determine the relative powers of the state, the city and the federal government in the premises. Upon its outcome hinges the question of whether or not Chicago can send enough Lake Michigan water down the Mississippi river to protect the lake from pollution.

"Through the sanitary district, which now comprises a territory of 388 square miles, covering the region from the town of Wilmette to the Indiana line, the city is both a real estate operator and the owner of a power plant. Nine great aluminum wires carry 42,000 horsepower cityward from the hydro-electric plant above Joliet. They supply one county, twelve municipalities, and many private concerns, besides furnishing the city itself with power for pumping water out of the lake into the city mains and the canal, and for lighting the fourteen thousand are lights used in the municipal system.

"The result of the opening of the
