A SERIES OF MISHAPS. AT DEMPSEY'S CAMP

Trainer Kearns Runs Down Soldiers—Bulldog Starts Trouble

Toledo, May 28.—Misfortune trailed the Dempsey camp. To escape a collision with an automobile at one of the busiest corners in the city, Jack Kearns, manager of the challenger, attacked the machine into a motorcycle, wrecked the cycle and side car were wrecked. One left-hand uppercut nearly lifted him off his feet. After the boxing Dempsey and Averell Harriman and Fred Allen are quoted as favoring it. YALE WILL ROW AGAINST ENGLISH CREWS NEXT YEAR

New Haven, May 28.—A movement has been started for a trip to England next year by the Yale crew, and it is possible the Harvard crew will be included in the affair. It is now as good as settled that the Yale and Harvard track teams will cross the Atlantic next summer to meet Oxford and Cambridge.
As far as Yale is concerned, the rowing squad will probably make the trip and compete in several races. The Yale undergraduate rowing management is enthusiastically in favor of the plan, and Dr. Mather Abbott, the crew coach, is a warm advocate of the proposition. He urged the scheme of entering the Yale crew in the Henley regatta on the English Thames this year, and was dissuaded from the plan only because it became clear that the Yale navy finances would not allow it.
