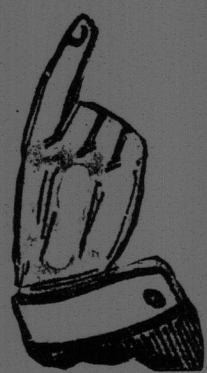

Quebec, June 27.—Contentions that the  
story submitted to the Empress direct  
commission by the captain and officers of

lision took place, and that Captain Ken-  
nedy, unassisted by the appearance of the

down, lost his head, formed the main  
part of the address made this morning  
by C. S. Haight. He attempted to show  
that the collision was not blame-worthy for  
the collision, which caused safety by the  
Empress being stopped directly in the  
path of the Storstad.

LONG DISTANCE METHOD—If a particular person is  
desired the call should be placed with the long distance operator  
in the regular way. The initial rate for this service will be 10  
cents for 3 minutes, and 3 cents for each additional minute.

TWO NUMBER METHOD—The subscriber calls the operator  
in the usual manner. The operator will answer, saying  
"Number." The subscriber will then give the operator the de-  
sired number following by his own number, as "Rothsley 20." This  
is Main 3014-21. The calling subscriber will hold the re-  
ceiver to his ear until connected with the called telephone, or is  
advised "Line Busy," or "They Don't Answer." If the called  
telephone answers it constitutes a message. A particular per-  
son will not be procured. The initial rate for this service will  
be 5 cents for 3 minutes and 1 cent for each additional minute.  
Messages cannot be reversed, but must be charged to the tele-  
phone from which they originate.

IMPORTANT—As the operator cannot tell the telephone  
number of the person calling, it is necessary that the subscriber,  
on either a special or party line, should give his own number as  
well as the number desired. A call from a subscriber in St.

CHURCHES IN SCOTLAND  
MAY BECOME ONE

Negotiations to Follow Recent  
General Assemblies of Both

Edinburgh, June 28.—The recent gen-  
eral assemblies of the two great factions  
of the Presbyterian churches in Scotland,  
the established Church of Scotland and  
the independent United Free Church,  
will be followed during the year by ne-  
gotiations which are said to be prom-  
ising a union of these rival bodies,  
ending a historical quarrel.

Various sects broke away from the  
communion of the state church as far  
back as the seventeenth century, the se-  
cession being in protest against the al-  
leged low moral state of the clergy and  
the political system of the established  
church. The established church sought  
to mend matters in 1844 by adopting the  
rule that no pastor should be thrust  
upon a congregation against the will of  
the people, but this was annulled in 1849.  
Negotiations for a union were renewed  
in 1907, but progress was slow until this  
year on account of the opposition of a  
powerful minority on each side. Even the  
former leaders of the obstructionists,  
however, are now urging union.

A constitution was drawn up by the  
recent assembly of the established

church which concedes the spiritual in-  
dependence of the free church but at the  
same time aims to preserve the tradi-  
tions of the state church. It is this draft  
that will be the basis of further ne-  
gotiations during the coming year, and the  
willingness with which leaders of both  
factions have taken up the subject leads  
the pacifists to hope for success.
