THE TYPOGRAPHICAL UNION

The reports of the officers of the International Typographical Union to the annual convention, now in session at Nashville, Tenn., have been sent out.

The organization has made great progress. In 1909 the average paying membership was 44,921, with average earnings of \$897. In 1911 the membership was 51,807 and average wages \$974. The year ending May 31, 1913, showed an average membership of 55,014, paid-up members, with average earnings of \$1,230. The last month of the year showed a total membership of more than 62,000.

One benefit of the 8-hour work day shown by the mortality tables is the average increase of life. In 1901 the average age at death was 41.84; this average has increased as the work day shortened until for the year ending May 31, 1913, it was 49.24.

WANTS INQUIRY MADE

Mr. Jarvis Writes City Authorities in Reference to Last Night's Fire

A fire last night in North Market street, reported to have originated in a pile of rubbish in a cellar, was a matter of discussion today at the meeting of the city council. The discussion was inaugurated by a letter received from W. M. Jarvis, which follows:

His Worship the Mayor, St. John: Dear Sir:—I enclose a cutting from the Daily Telegraph this morning with reference to a fire which occurred on North Market street last night. The companies I represent are not interested in any way, but it seems to me that when a purveyor of the establishment and a fire is originated from a mass of rubbish in a cellar there should be some investigation and as you are aware it is the duty of the police magistrate to institute an enquiry into the cause of the origin of the fire when his attention is drawn to the subject by proper authority.

I cannot, of course, vouch for the correctness of the statement in the newspaper, although such statements are usually accurate. I may say, however, that in my experience fully seventy-five per cent. of the fires that occur proceed from carelessness in one form or another, and this can be checked, a reduction in the fire loss and a consequent reduction in the rate for fire insurance must ensue.

Indeed, to my mind the criminality of anyone who, by neglecting to keep his cellar or any part of his premises in such a state as to prevent the occurrence of fires under ordinary circumstances, is only less in degree than that of an incendiary.

May I suggest that the attention of the police magistrate be drawn officially to the matter of water hydrants and the water supply. The size of the hydrants about the city was considered, and also the size of the service pipes. In some instances it was found that the latter were only two inches, whereas six inch pipes are considered necessary. At the present time some of these are being replaced, and the work will be carried on until all of the smaller and unfit pipes have been removed.
