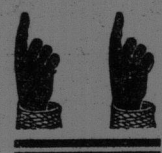

## Daily Hints For the Cook

### TOMATO JELLY AND EGG SALAD.

Soften three fourths of a box of gelatin in one-fourth cup of cold water. Heat water. Cook one pint of tomatoes, one half an onion, a stalk of celery, a bay leaf and a few cloves about ten minutes. Press through a sieve and add a tablespoonful of tarragon vinegar, a few grains of paprika and the gelatin which has been melted over hot water. Stir well and pour into a ring mold set with slices of hard-boiled egg, or turn into a plain mold and cut into cubes for serving.

### COCOA FRAPPE.

Stir together one quarter pound of cocoa and one one half cup of sugar. Pour over the mixture one cup of boiling water and cook until smooth and shiny. Add a scant two quarts of milk, to which a stick of cinnamon has been added. Boil ten minutes. Beat the white of an egg with a stiff add one half cup of sugar and a half pint of whipped cream and stir into the hot cocoa mixture. Cool, add a scant half teaspoonful of vanilla and freeze. Serve in glasses and with a spoonful of whipped cream on top.

## DELEGATES FROM HERE INVITED

### American Good Roads Men Want Representatives at Important Congress in Rochester

The American Good Roads Congress, in conjunction with the Eighth Annual Convention of the American Road Builders Association, is to be held in Rochester, N. Y., from November 14 to 17 and an urgent invitation to send delegates to this important gathering has been received by the St. John Board of Trade. An adjunct to the gathering will include men interested officially and otherwise in the scientific and practical construction and maintenance of improved highways. Experts in road making and those who have studied the subject from all angles have applied their theories in practice will give others the benefit of their experience.

During the sessions, the congress will discuss important questions connected with highway and street improvement but it is proposed to confine the deliberation especially to three topics—organization, construction and maintenance. An attractive and distinctive feature of the convention will be an exhibition of modern machinery, tools, appliances and materials used in building and maintaining city streets and country roads. An adjunct to the exhibition will be moving pictures and stereoscopic views which will give a practical idea of construction work. In addition to the invitations sent out by the Road Builders Association, His Excellency John A. D. Macdonald, governor of the State of New York, has sent special letters of invitation to the governors of the other states and to the lieutenant-governors of the Canadian province. The Board of Trade has not found it possible to send delegates but, in consideration of the importance of the gathering and the valuable information which will be available there, the board has been expressed that the city, municipality or the province will take the matter up and arrange to have representatives present.

### PLAN BIGGEST POULTRY SHOW

Spokane, Wtsh., Nov. 1.—Breeder in Spokane have organized to claim the first national championship poultry show, early in 1912, for this city. Officials of the American Poultry Association have endorsed the plan and promise to assist in every way. It is proposed to invite breeders in all parts of America to compete for prizes and trophies in every class, which will be free and open to all, and give an exhibition designed to eclipse the famous events in Madison Square Garden and the New York City. The sweepstakes probably will be \$1,000 in gold. The best birds in the United States and Canada will be brought together. It is likely, also, that breeders in Australia will be invited to make special exhibits. J. W. G. Handford, who is identified with the movement, says the exhibition will be the largest and most complete of its kind ever attempted in America.

## PARISIENNE DREADS THE CRINOLINE

A Word On Fashions From City Where The Dame Resides

### NEW DANCES OF YEAR

Business Man Sues to Compel Parents of Grand-child to Let Her Visit Him—Treachorous Act of Girl Against Her Former Employer

(Times' Special Correspondence.)

Paris, Oct. 19.—Frivolity is said to be the dominant note in the Parisienne's composition, but those who say this know nothing of the strenuous life of the average woman in the gay city. It is not merely dress and other women's husbands that interest her, as some of the modern novel-writers would have us believe. The Parisienne is essentially feminine. She lives to please, in the large sense of the word, follows the movement in literature and art, and knows as much about politics as the majority of her sisters in other countries; reads the reviews, attends the fashionable lectures by well-known academicians, and in a word a charming, lively, witty, sometimes, invariably womanly.

### The Crinoline

She has returned to town terribly concerned about the rumors of the approaching crinoline that have reached her in the country. Between the hours spent at her "broderie Anglaise" and the modern world, she is a bit of a nervous wreck. Life at the chateau is not always all it is painted, and the country house is as common in France as elsewhere.

The mere idea of the crinoline has made her lose all sense of proportion in her "declarations," and has sent her home decidedly nervous. "Say, we shall not be wearing those horrid hoops, Monsieur Bonnaire!" she said to the director of the Maison Laferriere, the dressmaker that have stood calmly waiting for the hysterical cry of the last year to come, when women of high degree dressed like "midnight" and were happy to be taken for anything they were not. M. Bonnaire smiled reassuringly, he told of the wonderful brocades, the rich damasks, the embroidered crepe-de-chine and reversible satins that are to be worn this winter, of the sweeping trains, of the fuller sleeves, of the waist in its normal place, of crinoline and fox, and of the great revival of lace.

Women will be enveloped in lace that only master-hand can dress—this sign of ultra-simplicity is over. The blouse and skirt and the long chemise effect of the dress of yesterday will be the little world girl will still be seen in the Tuilleries Gardens, where the midwinter cluster and share their luncheon of fried potatoes and fruit; but the careless dressing of the last season is not to be prolonged among the higher grades of women. The revival of lace has made the social boundary more distinct.

With a feeling of relief the Parisienne orders a couple of tulle gowns in a vivid blue and Egyptian pink, with rows of shining fringe and a row of beads and reaching to the wrist, to tide over the next few weeks.

### The Year's Dances

Dancing masters in France and a contingent of their foreign colleagues have just been holding their annual congress, and it is a fact that may be worth remarking, that the German element was in a considerable force. Very polite, indeed, was a speech delivered by a gentleman from Berlin, who generally absolved the Apache dance. Quite equal to the occasion, however, was one of the representatives of the French capital, who more than hinted that performances of that description had not originated in his native land. Patriotism, in fact, was the order of the day, as an English delegate claimed that bows and curtsies of the most elegant at the Majestic's court, as witness the veto against hobble skirts and the lord chamberlain's circular to the dressmakers of the west end. During the congress several novel dances were introduced, including variations of the mazurka and the waltz, and a "five-step Argentine."

In the opinion of these high authorities on matters terpsichorean, dancing, at least in good society, is becoming more simple. Gavottes, sarabands, and intricate country dances were succeeded by the waltz. Then followed the Boston, and now the Argentine dances appear to be the most in vogue. When, argued a professor, people of a certain amount of suppleness take part in them they present an ensemble "less shocking to the eye" than a badly-executed waltz or Boston. A simple movement is carried out with more facility, and therefore with more grace and ease than a difficult movement, and this remark applies particularly to the Argentine dances, which, as a delegate from South America gallantly declared, are executed with perfect grace by the Parisiennes. Of these dances the Argentine is in most vogue, and while such acknowledged authorities as the gentlemen assembled at this congress, regard these Argentine dances as at least an agreeable variation from the waltz and the polka, they certainly hold out hopes for people who have not been very successful in round dances, as, if they may yet figure to some advantage in the Argentine, or at least will present an ensemble "less shocking to the eye," which means they will not look too awkward and uncouth.

A remarkable legal point has been raised in a French court of law. The question at issue is whether grandparents have the right to see their grandchildren when they are at variance with their daughter and son-in-law. M. Ferdinand Perier, founder of the banking house of Perier & Co., a descendant of a minister of the second empire, has brought a suit to obtain possession of the custody of his grandchild, aged three years, shall be brought to his house on certain days in order that he and his wife may have the consolation of her society. M. Perier's daughter is married to M. Marchal, formerly a mining engineer, but now a director of Perier & Co.

Owing to certain differences of opinion on financial matters between M. Perier and his son-in-law, M. and Madame Marchal refuse to allow their little daughter to visit her grandparents and M. Perier now seeks the aid of the law in order that he may have an opportunity for displaying his grandparental affection. M. and Madame Marchal on the other hand, plead that affection for the child has nothing to do with the case, and that the desire of Grandpere Perier in wishing to compel them to bring Denise to his house is merely to cause them annoyance. To this the grandparents have entered the counter-plea that they are moved by pure affection, and also by the hope that the presence of their little grandchild at their house occasionally may be the means of effecting a reconciliation with her parents. There the matter rests for the present, as the case has been adjourned to suit the convenience of the lawyers engaged in it.

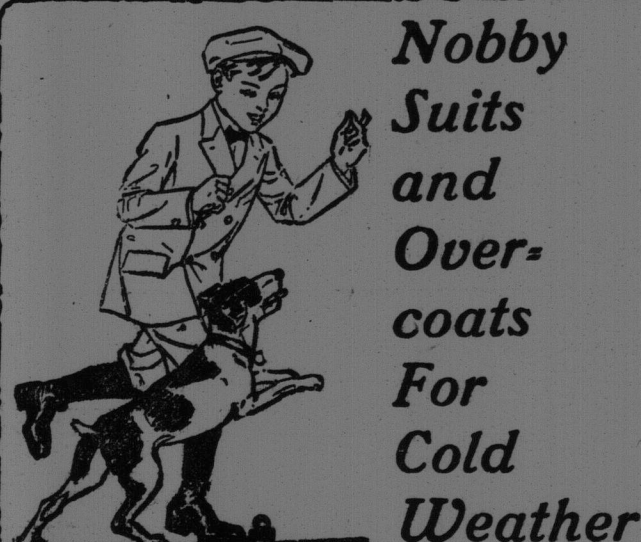

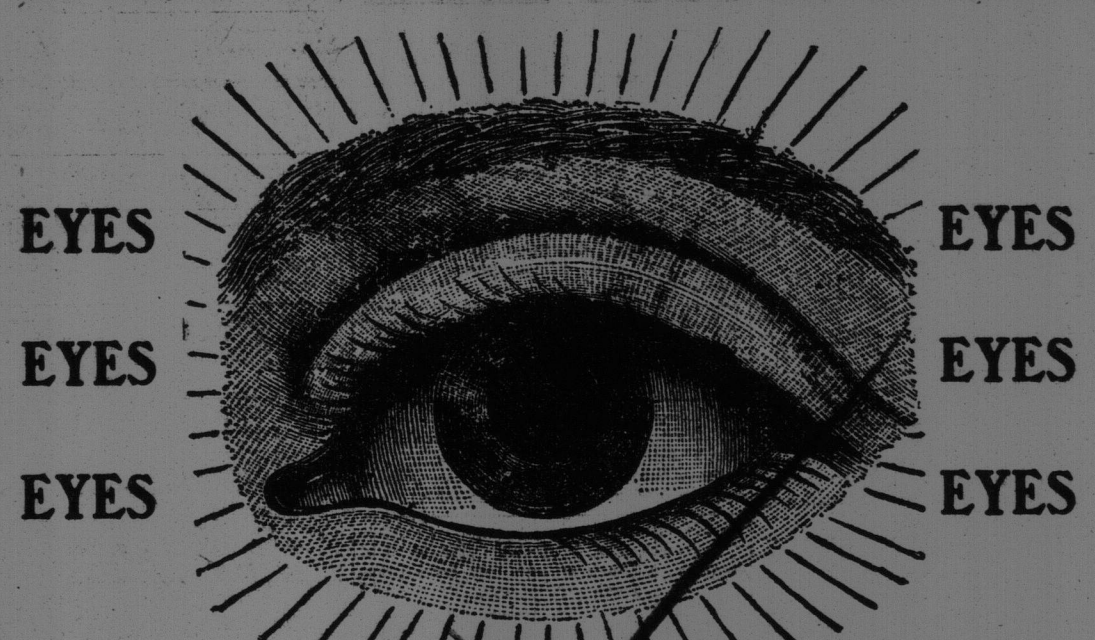
