Emperor Nicholas last week celebrated his forty-third birthday, and among the guests gathered from home and abroad in St. Petersburg in honor of the occasion, none received a greater amount of attention than the Crown Prince and Crown Princess of Germany. The latter was particularly welcome, for she is half Russian, her mother, the widowed Grand Duchess of Mecklenburg-Schwerin being the only daughter of that old Grand Duke Michael, Nicholas' grandfather, who until his death two years ago, was the most venerated and universally respected of all the members of the reigning house of Romanoff, renowned for his integrity, and for the liberalism of his ideas, and trusted above all others by his grand-nephew, the present Czar, who held him in quite special affection.

### Daily Hints For the Cook

#### CREAM TOAST.

Toast that is served with thickened milk is often called cream toast, although no cream enters into its composition. When the thickening is thoroughly cooked into the milk one will hardly miss the cream, and it will seem an easy matter to have so simple a dish always acceptably served, but it is often anything but palatable.

Read for cream toast, make the cut-a-little thicker than for plain toast, and it should be well dried and of a uniform brown.

If cream is used, boil it, and thicken it with one even tablespoonful of flour in cold water for each cup of cream, add a little salt and then let it cook in the double-boiler for at least 10 minutes.

When milk must take the place of cream heat it and add it gradually to one rounded tablespoonful of butter in a smooth saucepan. Add half a level teaspoon salt. Boil until thick and smooth and cook eight minutes. Dip the dry toast in a little hot milk and pour the thickened milk or "dip" over each slice.

If you want it very delicious serve with some mild apple jelly.

### SIXTY YEARS AN ACTOR

Dieudonne, Long French Actor, Recalls Rachel's Last Illness

A benefit performance was given recently in Paris to mark the retirement of Dieudonne, a French actor, whose first appearance took place in 1851.

"Yes," he said in an interview, "it is sixty years since I first appeared with a tiny part in 'Diables Emmeres' Comiques. Four years later, in 1855, I was one of Rachel's company on her tour in America, financing was to have a fatal end for the great tragedienne."

"I was much younger than she and she was as good as a brother, in fact it was greatly due to her that on board the boat which was taking us to America I became engaged to her sister, Dora, Felix, but we were not of the same religion, and when I returned to France I had to give up my matrimonial project."

"We were in Philadelphia when the great actress felt the first attacks of the malady which was to carry her off. In the hope that the climate of Cuba would benefit her Rachel went to Havana. I went with her and we arrived in the height of the dog days. I remember well that when I went to her hotel to present my wishes for New Year's day I had to cross the Tangu square at a run to avoid being scorching. I found poor Rachel suffocating with heat and all she said was, 'Oh, friend, let us go, let us go, I am going to die.'"

"Rachel returned to France soon after, and she died of consumption."

Dieudonne's greatest successes were won at the Michel Theatre, St. Petersburg.

"I have had the honor of playing before the great-grandmother of the present Czar," he said. "The Emperor Nicholas was a kindly giant who liked to laugh and loved the theatre. Occasionally he would seem to be cross."

"A young actress in the company always used to greet the emperor, when he passed her in the green room, with a military salute. This gesture always pleased the sovereign, but one evening he seemed offended, and said in a loud voice, 'Madame Volny, you have dirty gloves on. A few hours later a magnificent ring arrived for the actress, with the words written by the Czar, to help Mme Volny to forget the chagrin I may have caused her just now.'"

It cost the manager of the Michel Theatre \$8,000 to obtain Dieudonne's release from his Paris manager, but he recovered that sum many times over in the ten years Dieudonne remained in St. Petersburg. Years of success followed in Paris, where his name became so associated with a certain type of character that actors would say they were going to play a Dieudonne when they were to create an aristocrat, elderly and perhaps worn out and something of a rone. The rest of his history is the usual story ending with gratitude for a benefit after sixty years' work.
