

London, April 14.—Documents said to reveal plots involving the destruction of life and property in London are reported to have come into possession of Scotland Yard as the result of a raid last night on residences or resorts of Irishmen or women suspected of being republican supporters.

NEWEST WARSHIPS USE MARCO POLO'S 1292 IDEA. Washington, April 14.—The heirs of Marco Polo, the Venetian explorer, who antedated Columbus by some two hundred years, might prove a legal right to royalty fees against the newest American battleships, according to a study just completed by a naval construction expert. He found that the use of bulwarks in a ship's hull originated in the fleet which left a Chinese port in 1292, under Admiral M. Polo.

Premier E. C. Drury, who has headed the first farmer government of Canada for the last three and a half years in Ontario, has indicated his intention of going to the polls in June. This announcement followed charges of disloyalty to his party by Andrew Hicks, U. F. O. whip, who resigned.

ONLY ONE FROM NEW BRUNSWICK

Large Increase, However, in Business Failures in Canada Reported.

Toronto, April 14.—There is a marked increase in the number failures throughout Canada and Newfoundland during April, according to reports reaching R. G. Dun and Co.

For the week ended yesterday seventy-nine failures were reported, compared with thirty-nine last week, and fifty-nine a year ago.

Of this week's total twenty-seven were reported from Quebec, twenty-one from Ontario, twelve from Manitoba, seven from Saskatchewan, five from Alberta, three from Nova Scotia, two from British Columbia and one each from New Brunswick and Newfoundland.

For the second week in succession and the fourth time in the last two months no failures were reported from P. E. I.

A CANADIAN EXPLORER
