BREEDS.

judicious choice at the start, but one cannot go far astray if he select's a reliable breed, and then devotes time and attention to its development.

No breed of fowls to-day is perfection. They are all capable of improvement. If this were not so, there would be little interest left among the fanciers, and exhibitors would diminish in bead of increasing as they are each year. The life of poultry culture is the improvement of breeds. Any breeder who is satisfied to rest on the reputation that some one else has given a breed will soon be outclassed by the progressive fancier. The improvement of a breed of fowls should not be confised entirely to plumage and other show qualities. I will admit that this sort of improvement is in the ascendant the development of the fowls. Of course, what I mean by natural qualities are those tending or ggr production. But inasmuch as there seems to be more profit in show birds, we cannot blame breeders for catering to the greatest demand.

There is one breed of fowls and they constitute quite a family, which have been less injured by the improvement in show qualities than any breed I know of. I refer to the Leghorns. The Leghorns are what I call natural layers, that is, their chief object in life seems to be to lay eggs. They were, we must assume, originally created for such a purpose. They are an old breed, known the world over. They have been bred in many lands, and their reputation to day is as strong as it was thirty years ago. They are egg machines, pure and simple. Considered generally poor in market qualities, they have never been condemned for any other cause. Therefore, if we start by asking for their faults, we find them few. They have been improved in plumage, shape and size year after year, and yet they continue the same natural layers. If there is one breed the beginner can experiment with at the start and make a success with, it with at the start and make a success with, it is the Leghorn. They will thrive on almostany feed, and it is almost impossible to overfeed them, because of their very active habits. As for diseases, they are subject to few. If properly housed, they seldom have roup. Because of their tast and furious life—for they are the most active of all breeds—they have a lendency to "going light"—that is, to consumption.

But it does not fellow because they are great egg producers that every flock will lay the greatest possible number of eggs. Here there is a chance for improvement, just as in any other breed. They will stand neglect as well as any other breed and yet lay a sufficient number of eggs. But in order to obtain the greatest yield, their nature and habits must be studied. And I maintain that no other breed to day will give such ratificatory returns for the same care as the Leghorns. Being non-sitters, they have a great advantage over the heavier breeds in continuous laying. Since the incubator has proved a more popular substitute for the sitting hen, their non-sitting qualities are no drawback to their general usefulness. Especially is this true as their eggs hatch the best of all breeds, artificially. The chicks grow very fast and nature more rapidly and lay sooner than those of any other breed. At twelve weeks old they make the sweetest small broilers, their opponents to the contrary notwithstanding.

It is probably a fact that no variety of fowls has so quickly and so completely taken captive the heart of the practical coultry keepers as have the White Wandots. They are encroaching upon the popularity of the Barred Plymouth Rock, which for a decade has been the mest popular breed for poultry, by far, in the list. The reason for the high estimation in which the Wyandot is held is not far to see. In the first place, it has a splendid market form and is, moreover, a most excellent layer. The fowls are quiet and the hens make excellent mothers,—in fact, they cannot be excelled in this respect. When wanted for market, the Wyandot is always plump and fat, and this is a condition, too, that is true of them at almost any time after they are ten weeks old. Another point in favor of the Wyandot is to guick maturity. It can be got to laying in five months after hatching, almost as soon as the Leghorn, which has hitherto set the pace for early laying. The Wy undot is a more quiet foul than the Plymouth Rock, and can for this reason more easily be kept within bounds. This is unfoultedly due to the greater preponderance in the Wyandots are of great practical worth, but the white variety is accepted everywhere as being the practical fowl par excellence. It is being adopted by the great market poultry men more universally than any other fewl. Its white plumage makes its dress off in very hand some shape, while its dressed shape is almost ideal for market purposes.

A PECULIAR CASE.

Old Hunter-Tells the Difference Between a Buffalo Herd in H's Day and One Now.

Gazing on the scraggy remnants of buffalo in an enclosure at Glen Island, a Colorada

Gazing on the scraggy remnants of buffalo in an enclosure at Glen Island, a Colorada tourist in the East, said:

"They are buffaloes, I don't dispute that, but they are not the kind that used to make the West look like a moving eea. I reckon you have heard a good deal about extinct buffalo. Ten years ago I heard that the last buffalo had been killed—the last not in captivity. But the buffalo, like the Indian, dies hard. And I read about the last Iudian long pefore I began shedding my hair.

"There is a herd of buffalo in Colorado that has been knocking about for thirty years at least, and a man in that State who has made buffalo a life study tella me he knows of two herds. In 1865 there was a big herd in the country known as Middle Park. As the country was settled by whites the buffalo fell back. Hunters followed that herd to Milk River, but in the winter of 1875 the weather was so severe that the hunters gave up the chase. That was the great snow winter in Colorado. The snow was so deep that buffalo couldn't getaround. That's an actual fact. But it never gets too deep for Indians. That winter a band of Indians went after the buffalo and killed more than could be brought away. Next spring a lot of whites went out and got the tallow from the dead buffalo and findians went after the buffalo and killed more than could be brought away. Next spring a lot of whites went out and got the tallow from the dead buffalo and made money out of it.

"The white hunters brought back the news that the Indians had killed every buffalo in the herd. But that was like other buffalo stories. A few weeks later a herd was found on the headwaters of Troublesome River. It was a part of the herd which was snow bound. White hunters killed some of the herd and brought the meat into market and got into trouble for it, because there is law against killing buffalo in Colorado. This law operates against a white man, but an Indian can hunt and kill anything he likes and the law never touches him.

James J. Hill, president of the Great Northern Railway, believes that the flour milling business of Minneapolis will before long be transferred to Niagara Falls. The argument he adduces in favor of the theory seems a sensible one. It is much easier and cheaper to handle wheat than flour, and the nearer the wheat can be conveyed to the centres of consumption the cheaper can the flour be sold. Wheat is loaded by machinery and pours into vessels by gravity, whileflour in barrels requires human hands to move about. Another point in favor of Niagara Falls as a milling centre is its untimited water power and the fact that Buffalo is the centre of an enormous bread-consuming population. If this thoory is true in regard to the wheat product of the United States, it is equally true in regard to that of Canada. The nearer the wheat is shipped as such to the seaboard and consuming centres, the greater the economy.
