## SEVEN KILLED; MANY INJURED IN C. P. R. TRAIN WRECK

### Tragic End of Ontario Excursion

Train on Its Way to Toronto Exhibition Jumped Track on Sharp Curve—Terrible Scenes.

TORONTO, Sept. 3.—Seven persons were killed and a large number wounded in a wreck near Orangeville which occurred this morning. Five passenger coaches of a special train from Markdale carrying exhibition passengers were derailed.

The dead are: James Banks of Fern, P. O.; Norman Tucker, 12 years old, son of Bandmaster Tucker of Fleisher; John Thurston of Walters Falls; Armstrong A. Miller of Markdale; Jas. Brander of Buller of Briceville and two persons unidentified.

The injured are: J. Robinson, Orangeville; G. M. Davis, Parkdale; S. Boggs, Guelph; A. McDonald, Shelburne; Mrs. A. McDonald, Shelburne; Mrs. Dr. Caldwell, Fleisher; Mrs. McCormick, Markdale; D. Madill, Caledon; John Clayton, Markdale; John Boyd, Fleisher; Mrs. S. Webster, Horningsville; Frank Graham, Markdale; Geo. Rutherford, Shelburne; G. E. Gray, Markdale; J. E. Jolly, Shelburne; R. A. Jolly, Shelburne; W. A. Hillhouse, address unknown; H. Hallert, Orangeville; Margie Patterson, Badgerow, and one unidentified.

The train, which was very heavily loaded, left Owen Sound about eight o'clock, and when it reached Orangeville was one hour behind its schedule. From Orangeville there is a pronounced down grade for some distance, and the engineer attempted to make up time on this journey down the mountain. Rounding a dangerous horseshoe curve the engine left the track, all who were killed were riding in the smoking car, next to the locomotive.

Word of the catastrophe was sent to Orangeville and a train was sent out bearing all the doctors of the town and the necessary medical supplies.

Caledon, the scene of the wreck, is 42 miles northwest of Toronto and is situated directly on the line of the C. P. R. running to Owen Sound. It is in Peel County, in the township of Caledon, 7 miles by rail to the southeast of Orangeville, or six miles direct.

When the news of the accident reached Orangeville great excitement prevailed in the little town, and horses, carriages, wagons and almost every mode of conveyance was pressed into service to carry people to the wreck. Many persons who lived in the vicinity of the town had expected to see the wrecked train to the exhibition in Toronto. Lack of knowledge as to where they were on the train added to the consternation of friends, many of whom arrived at the scene of the wreck almost in a panic. These persons worked hard in rescue of the injured pinned beneath the cars. They employed their vehicles to carry the wounded to hospital. There every house and farm became a temporary hospital. Many of the wounded were brought to Toronto where the civil authorities placed hospital accommodation at their disposal.

### BELIEVE IT WAS MURDER

NEW YORK, N. Y., Sept. 3.—The body of Mollie Schenberg, a man with a long police record, was discovered in the Hudson River today. The police believe that he was murdered.

Sunday morning a party of six men, including Schenberg, went up the river in a launch. One of the men, who was reported to have been killed, was accidentally drowned. The police claim to have a confession from one of the men that Schenberg was thrown into the river because he refused to divide the proceeds of the recent robbery of a book-maker from whom \$7,200 was stolen at Brooklyn Bridge.

### RAIN MARRED HORSE SHOW

NEWPORT, R. I., Sept. 3.—Rain prevented today even more effectively than yesterday the usual display of fashion at the Newport horse show, the few women who ventured out in their fine gowns doing so at the risk of ruining them. The rivalry between Alfred and Reginald Vanderbilt for honors, which was so keen in yesterday's exhibition, continued to be the feature of the second day's show. The latter today won three firsts, three seconds and three thirds, while Alfred Vanderbilt captured two firsts, one second, two thirds and two fourths. In the final team class he had two entries, driving one of them, and he won both first and second prizes.

### GETTING READY FOR THE FISHING SEASON

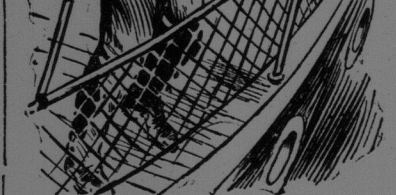

**MOTHER MADE WHISKEY TO SUPPORT HER CHILDREN**

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 3.—As result of an appeal in behalf of eight children in need of the care of a mother, President Roosevelt has granted a commutation of sentence in the case of Mrs. Adeline Rose, of Jackson County, Kentucky, who was convicted in the United States court for making and selling whiskey in violation of law. She was sentenced to pay a fine of \$1,000 and imprisonment for six months. Being unable, as she believed, to support her children in any other way, Mrs. Rose resorted to making and selling whiskey. She has promised to abandon the business.

### WORRYING OVER THE NEXT RULER OF CHINESE EMPIRE

PEKIN, Sept. 3.—The Manchu succession, native officials assert, has become the paramount topic at the summer palaces. One of the ablest foreign authorities says that more than a constitution for China or the amalgamation of the Chinese and Manchus is the question of an heir apparent which the Dowager Empress, the greatest of all Manchus, closely identified with the security of the dynasty.

The urgency of the question of the succession is serious, owing to the infirmities of the Dowager Empress, which are complicated by the threats of apoplexy and also by the serious condition of the Emperor.

One of Charles Stanley's most amusing experiences occurred at Brecon when he assisted Mrs. Patti in giving a concert in aid of the local hospital. The prima donna appeared with Mr. Stanley in a duet. ## MAN SHOT IN ROW AT DANCE

### Affray Took Place at Barryville Friday Night

#### County Elections at Chatham—French Acadians nominated D. S. Robichaud, for Local House

CHATHAM, N. B., Sept. 3.—At Barryville about twelve o'clock on Friday night, while a dance was in progress, Sanford Frisk of Pokemouche shot Allan McGrath of Barryville as the result of a quarrel.

Yesterday was nomination day for county councillors for the parish of Chatham, and Pasha Clerk V. J. McIntyre held a poll at the Town Hall. Jas. F. Connors was re-elected and J. Frisk, Benson succeeded F. E. Nook. The elections are held every two years.

At the Robichaud, the energetic and talented editor of La Justice, has been nominated by the French-Acadians of this county as their representative in the next local elections. The committee appointed some time ago met last night at the Babineau Hotel. There were present John LeBlanc, Andrew Arsenault of Rogersville, Romane Savoy, Louis P. Robichaud, A. V. Savoy, Neugue, S. Blanchard, Newcastle; Amos Suzy, Hardwick; Peter Archer and Rouben Babineau, Chatham. J. D. Paulin of Newcastle, though not present, requested that his vote be given to Mr. Robichaud.

While at Bay du Vin recently Rev. Dr. Raymond was shown a French coin dated 1786 of a fine mint, one of several which have been picked up at the Bay. Dr. Raymond secured this historical trophy for the St. John society. Engraved on the coin is the Latin inscription, St. Noron Domini Benedictum.

## PRELIMINARY HEARING ON

### F.B. Carvell, M.P., is Defending Thornton

#### Evidence in Hartland Fire Case Similar to That Given at the Fire Inquiry

HARTLAND, N. B., Sept. 3.—The preliminary examination of W. F. Thornton, charged with arson, began this afternoon before John Barnett, J. P., and aroused a great deal of interest, a large number of ladies being present. The accused was defended by F. B. Carvell, K. C., M. P., M. L. Hayward and D. McLa. Vince appeared for the prosecution. The evidence consisted largely of the strongest testimony given at the recent fire investigation.

The following witnesses were examined: Harris Keswick, W. D. Keith, Amasa Plummer, Henry Bradley, Mrs. S. S. Miller and Mrs. Elizabeth Thistle. The evidence went to show that the fire started in the basement of Thornton's drug store about one o'clock Monday morning, that no effort was made to save anything and that Thornton did not appear till about an hour after the fire broke out, and that then he walked slowly up the street wearing a collar and tie.

W. D. Keith testified to a conversation with the accused in Keith and Plummer's store, when he (Thornton) advised Keith to be well insured, as the whole thing would go up in smoke some day and that probably before long, also on another occasion when Thornton asked whether the witness would rebuild if burnt out. Several of the witnesses testified that the progress of the fire had been hastened by the use of kerosene or some other combustible.

Henry Bradley, the constable who arrested the accused, also gave evidence. Mr. Carvell questioned this witness with the view of showing that the account of the arrest as published in Monday's Telegraph was substantially incorrect. The examination will be resumed tomorrow at 10 a. m. This is Mr. Carvell's first appearance in the village since the close of the last session, and his friends gave him a most enthusiastic reception, being delighted to see him looking so well.
