## Synopsis of Canadian North-west Land Regulations

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

Issue.—In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$10.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate five acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$20.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.

## LAMP EXPLODES, DEATH FOLLOWS

TORONTO, Ont., May 25.—Mrs. Patrick Ryan was burned to death at St. Catharines this morning when a gas catching fire from an exploding lamp. When the clothing was taken from the body about four hundred dollars' worth of bills was found. It had been scorched, but was perfectly good.

## GLORIA SELLS FOR \$610 AT AUCTION

READVILLE, Mass., May 25.—But three horses went under the hammer at today's opening of the annual Paig-Tipton sales. Via St. Ka, 221-2, owned by the estate of the late Leander R. Peck of Providence, brought the highest price, \$118. Another horse from the same stable, Renner Robinson, brought but \$33. The buyers respectively were Wm. G. Gendry, of New York and John A. Miller, of Somerville. Gloria, an old campaigner on New England provincial tracks, with a mark of 2:10 1-4, owned by Frank Fox of Medford, went but for \$610 to P. J. Allen of Boston. (Gloria was formerly owned by E. LeRoy Willis of Sydney.)
