### STERLING COLLAPSES IN FIVE-MILE RACE

#### Runs Well for First Three Miles, But Pace is Too Hot

WINNIPEG, July 16.—Stirling of St. John ran the five mile race here yesterday at the C. A. A. U. games, but did not get placed. For the first three miles Stirling ran well, and was well up with the winner, Harold Parsons, of Niagara, but soon after he collapsed, the pace being too hot. This event was the only one in which westerners carried off a victory. Chandler of Vancouver and Schofield of Toronto ran well in the first three or four miles, but on the last quarter Parsons drew away from them and won handily.

The four hundred and forty yards race went to Lou Sebert of Toronto, who came within a fifth of a second of the Canadian record on a heavy track.

In the heat of the other sprints the Toronto men had it almost all to themselves, and are certain of first places in the 220, 1000 yards and hurdles.
