## DR. COOK HAS DATA WHICH WILL PROVE BEYOND CAVIL HE DISCOVERED THE POLE

Declares He Was Prepared to Learn Jealous Persons Were at Work

"Bully for Frederick!" Said Cook When He Reached Pole

Made Observations and Found That He Was Standing on Pole

Declares That He is in Better Condition Than Ever

COPENHAGEN, Sept. 3.—All Denmark tonight is awaiting the arrival of Dr. Frederick A. Cook, a regal welcome awaits the man whose announcement from Derwick on September 1 that he had discovered the North Pole started the entire world.

The steamer Hans Egede, on which the intrepid explorer is returning from the frozen north, passed Cape Skaugen, the northern extremity of Denmark, at 2 o'clock this afternoon, and is expected to make landfall at the Sound late tonight and tie up at her dock here tomorrow morning.

Cook interviewed  
LONDON, Sept. 3.—A special dispatch received here from Skagen says: "As the steamer Hans Egede steamed by, I caught through my glasses a vision of a small man in a dark suit and peaked cap, shading his eyes with his hands, as if straining to see the welcome civilization after years of icy exile. It was Dr. Cook, the explorer, whose name is on every tongue. He was climbing the rigging of the ship, now smiling, now waving his hand. I was allowed to board the Hans Egede."

"Somebody gave Dr. Cook a bouquet. Tears dimmed his eyes as he buried his face in their fragrant folds. It was only three older titles in the United Kingdom than that held by Lord De Clifford, who was the twenty-fifth baron."

His chief claim to public notice was his marriage in 1906 to Eva Carrington, a beautiful woman six feet tall, who was one of the "Gibson girls" in the musical comedy, "The Catch of the Season." After the run of the play she was engaged for a small part in "Bluebell in Fairyland," at the Aldwych Theatre, London.

She had become acquainted with Lord De Clifford while playing in Dublin in September, 1905. Shortly afterward Lord De Clifford went to Egypt. Returning in February, 1906, he proposed to Miss Carrington, was accepted and a few days later they were married at a registrar's office.

LONDON, Sept. 3.—Lord De Clifford was killed in a motor automobile accident today at Bramber. His car was overturned when his chauffeur tried to avoid a collision with two carts in a narrow road. Lord De Clifford's marriage to Eva Carrington, an actress, was a sensation of 1906. He leaves an infant son, heir to one of the oldest titles in the kingdom. There are only three older titles in the United Kingdom than that held by Lord De Clifford, who was the twenty-fifth baron.

### BUSY TIMES ON G. T. P. JOB FROM CHIPMAN TO PLASTER ROCK

(Continued from page one.)

Harry F. McLean is superintendent for the company in this province. His assistants in the executive office are: Charles M. Hall, assistant; Hector Rosevear, paymaster; Herbert O'Neill (or St. John) stenographer; Harry Babbitt, invoice clerk.

Charles J. Johnson is in charge of the company's warehouse; John T. Stinson is time keeper on ballast and track laying; John St. Louis, the inspector; and Alfred Oliphant, time keeper on concrete and water stations.

Wallace Parks holds the important post of outfit superintendent; George F. Armstrong, superintendent on ballast and steel; Michael Neelan is foreman in material yard; Ben. Levy, foreman on steel; M. E. Beatty, master carpenter; Charles Hart is foreman on concrete work from this place east; and Wesley Beatty from here west.

Daniel Fraser is superintendent of steam shovel outfit at Mullen Brook and J. D. McKinnon is the company's storekeeper there, and Louis Nelson is the superintendent of grading at Cairn's River.

The hotel keepers at this place are Herbert Moran and Charles Leibel, and general stores are conducted by John McElroy and P. H. McElroy. Mrs. McElroy is the postmistress.

The engineering residences having to do with the McGilvray and Cairn's River sections of the Toronto Construction Co. work are as follows: No. 2—H. M. Downing, resident engineer; J. B. Gilliatte and G. C. Reid, instruments; C. Sherwood, rod; C. C. Cunningham, chain; D. E. Hill, time keeper; T. V. McKinnon, axe; Adrian Spencer, cook; Weldon Hovey, fire warden.

The Dominion government police system in connection with G. T. P. Ry. construction could scarcely be improved upon. Hon. L. P. Farris is the commissioner and he is ably assisted by Chief Foster and the following: M. S. Keith, located at Moncton and running 20 miles north; Abner Belyea, headquarters at Chipman and running about 20 miles east; and the same north; James B. Gallagher, located at McGilvray's and running about 10 miles east and 10 miles north—in-cluding the Nappudagan Lake; Jos. Pearson, located at Miramichi Lake; Dennis Herbert, stationed at Edmundston and Raymond Herbert located at Baker Brook.

The Canada Eastern branch of the I. C. R. crosses the G. T. P. Ry. at this point. This vast improvement in that line since it was acquired as part of the government system of railways favor of Mr. Emmerson's plea for the absorption of all branch lines by the Dominion government. Besides being now a splendid railway property it is by long odds the best paying part of the I. C. Ry.

George Weir, long and favorably known in connection with the Central Railway, is at McGilvray's, having accepted an advanced position with the Toronto Construction Company. Thaddeus Gallant is the I. C. R. station agent at this point.

Meats are supplied the railway camp town by Douglas & McElroy—who do their own killing of imported cattle.
