So far no word has been received from him, and naturally his family are very anxious. It is feared that his mind may have become affected, but his friends are hoping that nothing serious has occurred to him.

### KEENLY INTERESTED IN FATE OF BENGORE HEAD

Captain and Officers Have Many Friends Here—Full Cargo Awaits Her—Was Bound First for North Sydney.

The Bengore Head, which is now drifting helplessly off the Newfoundland coast, left Belfast on December 27 bound for North Sydney, with a cargo of firebrick, fireclay, etc., for the Dominion Iron and Steel Co. As she had on board no cargo for St. John, no particulars of the shipments are available here.

After discharging at North Sydney she was to come to St. John in ballast for a return cargo for Belfast. While waiting for the steamer to turn up, cargo has been accumulating at St. John until there is now a full cargo on hand. On this account, in addition to the natural interest in the fate of the steamer and its crew, the agents and the shippers are anxiously awaiting word of the steamer and hoping for a safe arrival at an early date.

Capt. Pritchard, who is in command has been here frequently before and is well known around the port. This, however, is his first trip as captain of the Bengore Head. Other officers and members of the crew have also many friends who are deeply interested in their fate.
