In the presence of hundreds of Roman Catholics from all over the province, and with all the pomp of the Roman Catholic ceremony, Rt. Rev. Edouard LeBlanc was raised to the episcopal dignity yesterday, and consecrated Bishop of the diocese of St. John. The consecrating bishop was his apostolic delegate, Rt. Rev. Monsignor Stagni, assisted by Archbishops McCarthy of Halifax and Bruchet of Montreal. Four archbishops, seven bishops and nearly two hundred priests from all over Canada were in the sanctuary during the ceremony, which was followed with interest by the largest congregation which has ever assembled in the Cathedral. The solemn procession was delivered by Rt. Rev. Dr. Morrison, Bishop of Antigonish. Long before the appointed hour the seating capacity was met, and hundreds who were not fortunate enough to secure seats thronged the aisle. When the ceremony began, the scene presented was a brilliant one. The elaborate decorations of the altar, the candles and candelabras and together with the rich robes of the officiating ministers made up a spectacle of lights about its sanctuary. The ceremony of the consecration was followed with rapt attention by the congregation. Mons. Stagni Celebrate Mass. The celebrant of the pontifical mass was Monsignor Stagni, the consecrating bishop, who had as assistants Archbishops McCarthy and Bruchet. The other officers of the mass were: Mr. Hebert, of Beaufort; high priest, Fr. Milan, Antigonish; deacon, Rev. P. Bellevue, Grand Digby; sub-deacon, Rev. Frs. Leg, St. Paul and Ryan, St. Mary's, as Jaques of Antigonish; Rev. A. W. Neohas, St. John and McMurray, masters of ceremonies. In addition to those who took part in the ceremony there were in the sanctuary Bishops D. H. Gauthier, Archbishop of Ottawa; Auxiliary Archbishop Roy, Quebec; Right Rev. F. Barry, Bishop of Chatham; Right Rev. James Morrison, Bishop of Antigonish; Right Rev. Blais, Bishop of Rimouski; Right Rev. J. M. Emard, Bishop of Valleyfield; Right Rev. J. S. H. Brunault, Bishop of Nicolet; Right Rev. J. P. Riopel, Bishop of Sherbrooke; Right Rev. F. X. Cloutier, Bishop of Three Rivers. There were other distinguished clergymen, Canon Monsignor, and special representatives of Bishops who could not attend. In the side chapels were seated the priests, who some found seats in the body of the church. The Ceremony. After the consecrator and assistants entered the sanctuary and vested the ceremonies began. The consecrator took his place in the middle of the altar, seated with his back to it; and the bishop-elect, vested and wearing his biretta, was led between two laymen, and being seated before the consecrator, after a pause the rose with heads uncovered. The apostolic mandate commissioning the new bishop to take charge of the see of St. John was read. The bishop-elect followed by the examination of the bishop-elect in matters of faith, after which the oath was received. The mass then began and continued until the gradual when the second part of the consecration was carried out. That is the anointing of the bishop. The investiture of the new bishop then followed. The consecrator then prayed for grace for the candidate and blessed the staff. The consecrator and the assistant bishops, then the bishop-elect, said to him: "Peace be with thee." And he answered to each: "And with thy spirit." The new bishop then returned to his chapel, and being again led in before the consecrator, he knelt before him and received two loaves of bread and two small barrels of wine and two lighted torches, and kissed his hands. The bishop-elect, then, kneeling, said to which the faithful made their offerings on such occasions for the support of the clergy and other purposes connected with religion. From the offertory to the communion, the new bishop stood at the Epistle side of the altar and sang and recited together with the consecrator; and after the benediction, the consecrator sat again before the altar, and blessed the mitre, and placed it on the new bishop's head. The new bishop, with the assistant bishops, afterwards proceeded around the church, with mitre, staff, robes and gloves and ring, and blessed the people. The sermon of the occasion was delivered by Rt. Rev. James Morrison, D. D., Bishop of Antigonish, and was eloquent and scholarly. Dinner to Church Dignitaries. In the monastery of the Good Shepherd following the ceremony, His Lordship Bishop LeBlanc was host at a dinner tendered the church dignitaries. The room had been artistically decorated for the occasion, the colors of the apostolic delegate, yellow and white, predominating in the color scheme. Six large tables were set with place for one hundred and seventy-five guests. At the head of the room on a raised platform, was the table at which Bishop LeBlanc presided. At his right was seated Monsignor Stagni, and the others at the table were the archbishops, bishops and other dignitaries. At the other five tables were the priests of the city and outside parishes.
