

YARMOUTH MAN LEAVES PECULIAR WILL

Daughter to lose share if marries certain man — Leaves bequest for Band Concerts and names selections band must play.

Yarmouth May 13.—The last will and testament and codicil of the late George N. Crosby, of Bear River, have been probated. It is unusual in many respects. The first two clauses appoint as executors and trustees the following: Sarah S. Crosby, B. Frank Gullison, Arthur Eugene Gullison and Doris Crosby. The first three names are also appointed guardians of Doris Crosby and son of the deceased.

Third, I give and bequeath to my said daughter Doris Crosby, when she marries, the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00), and on the event of each and every child born to her, and when such child or children shall have respectively attained the age of three months, I bequeath to her the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00).

Fourth, In case that my said daughter Doris Crosby, does not marry and remains single and unmarried, I bequeath to her the income of fifty dollars (\$50.00) per month during the time that she remains single and unmarried.

Fifth, On the event of the marriage of my son Theophilus Crosby, I bequeath to him the sum of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500.00), and on the birth of any child or children of said marriage, and when any such child or children shall have attained the age of three months respectively, I bequeath to my said son Theophilus Crosby the sum of six hundred dollars (\$600.00).

Sixth, When my said daughter Doris Crosby shall have attained the age of thirty-six years, and if she then be single and unmarried, and my said son Theophilus Crosby be then married and have children, I devise and bequeath to them both the residue of my estate, both real and personal, share and share alike.

Seventh, But should my son Theophilus Crosby be unmarried and without children, when my said daughter Doris Crosby shall have attained the age of thirty-six years, I hereby revoke clause six of this will and testament, and devise and bequeath the residue of my estate, both real and personal to my said daughter Doris Crosby without reservation.

Eighth, Should my wife Theresa I. Crosby marry within three months after my decease, I bequeath to her the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00).

Ninth, Should my said daughter Doris Crosby marry on or after the date of this will, I hereby revoke clauses three, four, six and seven of this will and testament and devise and bequeath to my said son Theophilus Crosby the residue of my estate both real and personal, and I direct that my executors and trustees hereinbefore named shall first pay, or cause to be paid, and discharged all my just debts, funeral and testamentary expenses incidental to the settlement of my estate, and to make any necessary investments of money or moneys as necessary for the benefit of my said estate, the law shall so direct.

Tenth, I direct that my executors and trustees herebefore named shall first pay, or cause to be paid, and discharged all my just debts, funeral and testamentary expenses incidental to the settlement of my estate, and to make any necessary investments of money or moneys as necessary for the benefit of my said estate, the law shall so direct.

MT. A OFFICERS' TRAINING CAMPS WAS REVIEWED YESTERDAY

Sackville, N. B., May 10.—The Mount Allison Contingent of Canadian Officers' Training Corps, under command of Capt. F. E. Wheelock, was inspected this afternoon by His Honor Lieutenant-Governor Wood. On this inspection the Lieutenant-Governor was accompanied by Dr. Borden, president of the university, and Capt. A. H. Borden, D. A. A., and Q. M. G. Halifax garrison. As the representative of His Majesty the King His Honor was given the royal salute.

After the general inspection by the Lieutenant-Governor, Capt. Borden made a further inspection in company and platoon movements.

One interesting feature of the review was the attack organized on the Ladies' College. The attack was skillfully made, the forces keeping well under cover as though they were accustomed to that method of approach. The young ladies, however, did not seem unduly alarmed. In fact, it was insinuated that under other circumstances they might have received the invaders with open arms.

The company was formed up in front of the Ladies' College, and were addressed by His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor, who complimented the men on their fine showing. He declared that although he had reviewed a number of such companies, the work done was the best amateur performance he had seen.

At the close of the inspection, Capt. Borden declared officers, non-commissioned officers, and privates, 139 in number, as efficient.

A further examination will be held on the 26th and 27th inst., when fifty or sixty of those pronounced efficient will present themselves as candidates for Lieutenants' certificates.

In which I bequeath to my daughter Doris \$500.00 per month until she marries, I desire to state that clause and make the money payable only while she lives separate and apart from her mother Theresa I. Crosby, and obeys the commands of her guardians. And the payments are also to cease if she lives in the United States for a longer period than three weeks in each year. After the bequests are paid, then the residue is to revert to my son Theo. Crosby.

The \$500.00 per month payable to my daughter Doris Crosby is to be for her full maintenance and education, and to include the salary of a chaperon or lady companion for my said daughter during her vacation, also the renting and furnishing of rooms, should she require same. It is also my wish and request that my daughter Doris Crosby deliver up to my executors and trustees the \$4,000.00 life insurance money which is payable to her at my death, to be administered by them according to the terms of my last will and testament. Should my daughter Doris Crosby refuse to deliver up the said sum of \$4,000.00 to my executors and trustees, then the terms of my will shall prevail the same as if my said daughter Doris Crosby should marry — and her portion shall revert to the residue of my estate.

The will was witnessed by H. S. Sinclair and A. M. Sinclair. The codicil was witnessed by W. S. Porter and L. E. Porter, and is as follows:

I, George N. Crosby, being of sound mind do hereby on this 24th day of March, A. D. 1914, hereby add this codicil to that clause in my will which says that my daughter Doris's portion of my estate reverts to my son Theo, should she marry — contrary to my wishes, I hereby revoke said clause, and instead of the portion of Doris reverting to Theo, should she marry — I hereby make the following bequest: \$300.00 as a perpetual fund to be held in trust by the trustees of the Port of Maitland and Bear River Cemetery Company, to be invested and the income used to keep my lot in order in said cemetery perpetually. \$300.00 as a fund to be used, principal and interest, to pay the Yarmouth Band \$30.00 for giving two concerts in each summer, as near the middle of July and August as possible, the Band to consist of twelve instruments at least, and each concert to consist of ten selections, and to play at each concert the following selections: Hearts and Flowers, The Setzette from the Opera Leda, Dreamland, Faces, and Melodies of Love; the other selections to be the popular airs of the day. \$100.00 to my mother and each of my brothers and sisters. \$100.00 Scotia Lodge. \$100.00 to Albert Wyman, of Bear River. \$200.00 to disburse the minds of the public of the evil reports circulated regarding me. \$1,000 to Pauline Christie, daughter of Verna F. 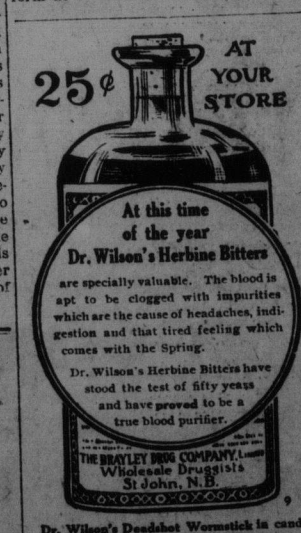

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency, or by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not the Sub-Agency) on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$20.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right, may pre-empt a quarter-section in certain districts. Price \$20.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months on each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$200.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation on certain conditions.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST MINING REGULATIONS.

COAL—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty years, renewable at an annual rental of \$1 an acre. Not more than 2,500 acres may be leased to one applicant. Royalty, five cents per ton, in applicant's territory the tract must be unreserved territory the tract must be staked out by the applicant in person, and personal application to the Agent or sub-Agent of Dominion Lands for the district. In all cases a bond, and the rental must be paid to the Agent or sub-Agent for the first year must be paid to the Agent within thirty days after filing application.

QUARTZ—A person eighteen years of age and over, having made a discovery may locate a claim 1,500 feet by 1,500 feet. Not less than \$100 must be expended in development work each year. DRESSING—Two leases of five miles each of a river may be issued to one applicant for a term of 20 years. Rental \$10 a mile per annum. Royalty, 2 1/2 per cent, after the output exceeds 15,000 tons.
