

A. W. HAY JOINS DOMINION IMMIGRATION DEPARTMENT

Commissioner of Farm Settlement Board Resigns to Take up Special Duty for Dominion Government in Connection with Ready Made Farm Plan.

Special to The Standard. Fredericton, Jan. 22.—A. W. Hay, of Woodstock, has resigned as a commissioner of the Farm Settlement Board and has been appointed as a special agent of the Dominion Immigration Department, to act in conjunction with the Farm Settlement Board in the carrying out of the ready-made farms policy in New Brunswick.

Mr. Hay has already entered upon the duties of his new position and has been in consultation today with A. B. Wilmot, the Dominion Immigration agent for New Brunswick, with headquarters in this city. Both are to co-operate in carrying out the work of the Farm Settlement Board and Mr. Hay will inspect all properties purchased,

as well as be in charge of all improvements made in properties under the provisions of the act and with approval of the board.

The Farm Settlement Board have thus far invested upwards of \$30,000 in the purchase of various properties in the province and about as fast as properties are located and purchased they are resold under the provisions of the act. Last week a property at Canterbury, York County, was purchased and this evening Mr. Hay accompanied by Mr. Wilmot, left for Stanley to inspect several properties there preparatory to their being taken over by the board. Three properties at Glasville, Carleton County, were also selected by Mr. Hay last week.

SHIPBUILDING PROPOSITION BEFORE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL

W. Burton Stewart, Acting for Norton Griffiths Company, Asks for Assistance to Extent of About \$65,000 per Annum to Guarantee Sinking Fund.

After hearing W. Burton Stewart in reference to the request of the Norton Griffiths Company for financial support in connection with the dry dock the council yesterday afternoon went into a committee of the whole in private session, and discussed the matter at some length. They did not decide on the dry dock, but it was said the council generally were willing to do anything reasonable to assure a shipbuilding industry. They took the stand that the company was asking for considerable concessions, and that before they should commit themselves definitely to anything they should have ample assurance that the proposed industry would materialize. It was suggested that a small committee should be appointed to confer with the provincial government and the Norton Griffiths people, but it was decided that if a joint conference was held all the members of the council should be present. What the company want is a guarantee of \$65,000 per annum to cover the sinking fund of a shipbuilding plant in connection with the dry dock.

When the council convened in the afternoon it went into committee of the whole, and W. Burton Stewart was introduced.

J. H. Nobles and W. J. Crawford appeared on behalf of the Master Plumbers' Association, asking that the next vacancy on the Board of Health be filled by a master plumber, and that a practical plumber be appointed plumbing inspector.

A letter from the general superintendent of the C. P. R. asking permission to lay another track across Station street, Fairville to facilitate the handling of trains at Fairville, was presented. Councillor Bryant was heard in explanation. On motion of Councillor Frink, Councillor Smith, Dean, Long, Corcoran and Golding were appointed to report at the next quarterly meeting.

A petition from Turnkeys Clifford and Cunningham for an increase in salary from \$60 to \$70 a month was referred to the finance committee.

All officers reappointed.

The annual report of the deputy registrar of deeds and wills for 1912 was submitted. It showed a net return of \$2,622 to the municipality.

In proceeding to the arrangement of the parish highway assessment the county secretary drew attention to the fact that none of the parties had complied with the regulations.

The rates were as follows:—Simonds, 20 cents; Musquash, 20 cents; Lancaster, 20 cents; and St. Martins, 20 cents. The difference of opinion whether the rate was 24 or 28 cents, the secretary maintaining that the rate was 28 cents, while the members said only 24 cents was assessed.

Will Cost \$65,000 Per Year.

The proposition presented to the city some time ago was outlined by W. Burton Stewart. He wanted the county to join with the city and province in guaranteeing the sinking fund on the expenditures for the dry dock, a guarantee of about 1 per cent, on \$65,000 or \$65,000 a year would be necessary. The company would make the sinking fund a first charge upon the property. It would not ask for contributions to the sinking fund for five years and was prepared to deposit enough money to meet the sinking fund requirements for the first five years. This is the county would not be called upon to pay anything for ten years.

The company wanted the guarantee of the province and city in order to dispose of its bonds to advantage. The government subsidy would only pay interest at the rate of 3 per cent. The million dollar worth of bonds on that basis would yield about \$2,600,000 in cash. In consideration of the guarantee of the sinking fund the company would undertake to secure the establishment of a steel shipbuilding plant.

Willing to Buy Municipal Home.

Mr. Stewart said the idea was to form a corporation to take control of the dry dock and operate a shipbuilding plant. This company would be capitalized at \$1,000,000; one-third in bonds, one-third in common stock, and one-third in common stock. The common stock would be distributed as a bonus.

Com. Agar—in other words the common stock would be water.

Mr. Stewart said some members of the Board of Trade had suggested that 25 per cent of the common stock should be given to the city and province. That was a matter for consideration.

His company would be willing to negotiate for the purchase of the Municipal property which was directly back to the site of the proposed shipbuilding plant.

Mr. Stewart Explains.

To Com. Schofield Mr. Stewart said the contract with the government called for the establishment of a repair plant in connection with the dry dock. This plant would cost about three-quarters of a million. To enlarge the dry dock as proposed would require an additional sum of about \$250,000.

To Com. McLellan, Mr. Stewart said the shipbuilding company would be willing to pay taxes. All they wanted was equal treatment.

Com. Agar—if the Federal government pays the interest on the bonds, and we provide the sinking fund, then you will be getting the dry dock for nothing.

Mr. Stewart—Yes, if we could issue bonds for 3½ per cent. But it is likely we will have to pay 4½ or 5 per cent, to get any price for them. The dry dock of 900 feet will cost \$4,000,000, and the capital value of the 3½ per cent. subsidy is only \$2,600,000. I'd be very glad to give you the dry dock, but you will be getting the Federal government to get out of the contract?

Mr. Stewart—Nothing. I'd sooner gamble on it. There is no money in operating a dry dock, but in connection with a shipbuilding plant it would be a desirable thing.

The Reporters Excluded.

After the withdrawal of Mr. Stewart the council was reconvened and Mr. Coughlin was reappointed marshal. The Warden—the council now reports will withdraw.

The County Secretary—you can't exclude the public from a meeting of the council.

Com. McLellan—Then I move that we go into committee of the whole and hold a private session to consider the Norton Griffiths proposition. This was adopted and the public excluded.

The Morning Session.

At the morning session, after hearing Rev. H. E. Thomas and A. M. Scott, the council considered the Child Protective Bill, which it is said will be presented to the legislature as a government measure, but which will not become operative till a child's protective society is incorporated.

TESTIMONY OF ROCKEFELLER INSISTED ON

U. S. Money Trust Committee Again Orders that Oil Magnate be Examined—Brokers on Stand.

Washington, Jan. 22.—An attempt to delay the money trust committee decision to insist upon an examination of William Rockefeller despite his physical condition, was defeated today in a rather stormy executive session of the committee. Against the wishes of Chairman Pujo, the committee reiterated its decision directing him and counsel Samuel Undermyer to make arrangements for Mr. Rockefeller's examination. Chairman Pujo announced after the executive session that he would probably visit Mr. Rockefeller with Mr. Undermyer next week. Mr. Rockefeller is now at Palm Beach, Florida. The incident was re-opened by the appearance of Dr. Walter F. Chappell, personal physician to Mr. Rockefeller, who verified his affidavit setting forth that an examination of his patient might cause serious physical results. He described at length Mr. Rockefeller's ailments. Following Dr. Chappell's examination William J. Wolman of the firm of J. S. Bache, New York brokers, was questioned as to the practice of brokers collecting interest on stock carried for customers after the stock had been loaned to other customers at interest.

FAVORS FREE TRADE BETWEEN FRANCE AND OVERSEA COLONIES

Paris, Jan. 22.—The new French Minister of the Colonies, Jean Morel, declared himself today in favor of free trade between France and her colonies, the introduction of which would mean the free entry of colonial products into France and French products into the colonies instead of the half duty now imposed on imports. Morel will give his support to the measure for a reform of the colonial tariff introduced into the Chamber of Deputies by the cabinet of which P. Waldeck-Rousseau is premier.

TORONTO IS TO HAVE 20 STORY BUILDING.

Toronto, Jan. 22.—Toronto is to have a 20 story building, Canada's highest, on the northeast corner of King and Yonge streets, towering three stories higher than the Canadian Pacific railway structure across the street. It is to be the Royal Bank building, plans for the building were passed by the controllers today. Controller Foster dissented because he considered a height of 250 feet too much on a congested downtown corner. The skyscraper is to cost \$2,400,000.

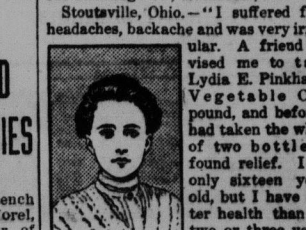

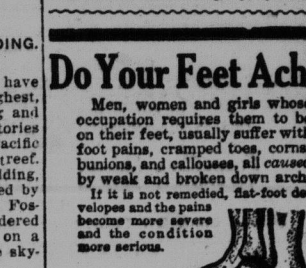
