Work Has Already Begun and Structure is to be Completed by December 20.

That Montreal will have a new hockey arena for this winter was assured on Saturday morning, when a meeting was held between the owners of the old Mount Royal rink on St. Urbain street and Mount Royal Ave., and the promoters of the Mount Royal Arena Company. A deal for the possession of the property for the site of the new arena was closed. The contracts for the building were awarded, and plans for the season decided on by the company.

The contracts call for the completion of the building by December 20, opened a week later. It has been found impossible to install an artificial plant for this winter, but will be installed next season. The building will be made suitable for concerts as well as athletic entertainments, and will have a seating capacity of four thousand.

Applications have already been received from the Montreal City Amateur Hockey League, the Junior Amateur Hockey Association, the Canadian Hockey Club, and the McGill Hockey Club, for their intercollegiate games, for various hours and dates for the playing of their matches.

STAY-AT-HOME'S DUTY AS CLEAR AS SOLDIER'S

Victory Loan 1919 Gives Men a Chance to Fire a Last Dollar Before the Finish.

News of the approaching armistice did not reach the men of one of the Canadian field batteries until well on into the forenoon of November 11. When it did come it did not have the effect one might imagine.

The battery had come out of the line the night before for a couple of days' rest and were billeted in a small village. There had been rumors, but nothing definite. The major—he had been out over three years—came rushing out from the house in which was located the officers' mess.

"Halt action, front!" The guns were unhooked from their limbers, the ammunition dumped from the limbers. "Make it!" the old major was crying. "We've only got a few minutes."

No. 1 had hardly got away its first shell when a brigade officer swept up to where the battery commander was standing. The major's hand went up. "Cease firing!" It was the last time the order was to be given in that unit. The war was over.

But the Canadians had stuck to their job right up to the last minute. They did their share out there in France, and now it is the duty of the people at home to do theirs. The war is not yet over. There is a big war bill to settle; the country must be swathed during the period of reconstruction; the men who stuck to their jobs must be re-established in life; the wounded looked after; the dependents of the dead secured against want.

It is the last lap in the race of the Great War, and Canadians at home must stick to it to the end by making the Victory Loan 1919 a roaring, sweeping, overwhelming success.
