Winnipeg to Finance Big New Industries. Plan to Assist in Supplying Capital for Winnipeg Factories Meeting With Approval.

Western Metropolis to Meet Competition of Smaller Places Which Offer Free Sites, Bonuses and Exemption from Taxes.

(Manitoba Free Press.) The Free Press learns that several of the strongest local capitalists have undertaken a plan for securing money for capital for local industries.

The time seems to be opportune for the bringing forward of some comprehensive and well thought out plan of industrial development for Winnipeg.

The Industrial Bureau has done admirably well in the past, but it is necessary to have additional machinery to actually get results from the good things already done.

An underwriting syndicate with large capital (proposed five millions), to underwrite and place upon the market stocks of smaller concerns, is being formed.

The board of experts would be made up of men expert in the different lines of trade that might be carried on here, not necessarily composed altogether of Winnipeg men as it would probably be found advisable in some cases to have outside expert opinion.
