### STATUS OF WOMEN

#### PROVISION OF SHELTER FOR VICTIMS OF FAMILY VIOLENCE— MOTION UNDER S.O. 43

**Mr. Walter McLean (Waterloo):** Madam Speaker, the Standing Committee on Health, Welfare and Social Affairs tabled in this House on May 6, 1982, its third report—an inquiry into violence in the family. Among its many recommendations the committee calls on this government “to appropriate initial capital costs of new emergency shelters and funds for second stage housing” to offer protection and security to the thousands of Canadian women who are victims of domestic brutality. In light of financial obstacles facing emergency shelters, including Anselma House, a shelter for battered wives in the Waterloo riding, arising from CMHC’s refusal to allocate funds for their second stage housing project, I move, seconded by the hon. member for Calgary West (Mr. Hawkes):

That this House urge the government to adopt the committee recommendation regarding second stage housing without delay and thereby demonstrate concern for victims of family violence.

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### HAZARDOUS SUBSTANCES

#### DEMAND FOR BAN ON FUNGICIDE CAPTAN—MOTION UNDER S.O. 43

**Mr. Simon de Jong (Regina East):** Madam Speaker, I also rise under the provisions of Standing Order 43. Whereas the Health and Welfare Department still demands the banning of the fungicide Captan because it is a cancer-causing agent and

a danger to health; whereas the Department of Agriculture proposals will not effectively reduce public exposure to Captan; whereas a study by the Department of the Environment called for the transfer of registration of pesticides from the Department of Agriculture to a less biased agency, I move, seconded by the hon. member for Mission-Port Moody (Mr. Rose):

That this House instruct the government to institute an immediate ban on the domestic use of Captan, significantly reduce acceptable residue levels of Captan on fruit and vegetables, and convene a parliamentary inquiry into the registration process of pesticides and other chemical products.

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### NATIONAL DEFENCE

#### FUTURE USE OF CANADIAN FORCES BASE CHATHAM, N.B.— MOTION UNDER S.O. 43

**Mr. Bob Corbett (Fundy-Royal):** Madam Speaker, since February of this year I have put five questions to the Minister of National Defence (Mr. Lamontagne), and introduced three motions on behalf of the people of the Chatham-Newcastle area, with reference to the government’s decision to neuter CFB Chatham and destroy approximately 3,500 jobs in the process—all to no avail. After mammoth representations, including a delegation from the provincial Liberal Party, the government has made a colossal statement that the base will retain “some” military functions. I move, seconded by the hon. member for York-Sunbury (Mr. Howie):

That the government indicate if it is their intention to set up a retirement home for outdated tanks and leaky cruisers, a military museum where most of the Armed Forces gear could now go, or a memorial to those brave souls of the region who did not want to go down with the ship.
