of horses and a waggon to assist in putting up the hay. He is taking with him provisions, flour, lard, tes and sugar, to the value of \$ 150.00, as a first payment on the 200 tons of hay contracted for.

On my road back from Brandon I saw Mr Ogiltree and am taking this
Pairford part off his hands as regards the putting up of hay, and will
try and get all the hay on the reserve put up this year. There is an
old hay press on the reserve but if I get all the hay put up it will
be necessary for me to buy the press. I arranged for last year with
Mr Vincent. He has the press and will sell for the same price,
\$ 505.00. laid down at Fairford, and I will want the same wire and oil,
a total of \$ 540.00. If you will authorise this I will get a
resolution passed by the band agreeing to refund this sum to the
Department in four annual payments. If the proposition is agreeable
to the Department. I would like a wire to that effect, as I am going
up to the reserve next week.
