A FEARFUL DISASTER. 483 LIVES LOST BY THE SINKING OF H.M.S. VICTORIA. Rescued by a Steamer Ship the Sank So Quickly That Scarcely Was Impressed.

The Victoria, which flew the flag of Vice-Admiral Sir George Tryon, R.C.D., was run into off Tripoli by the British battleship Camperdown, also belonging to the Mediterranean squadron.

The Victoria had an enormous hole made in her side, through which the water poured in torrents. The immense Victoria sank in 18 fathoms of water.

ESQUIMAULT DEFENCES. Arrival of Gen. Hester to Confer With the Imperial Authorities. LONDON, June 26.—Gen. Hester, who arrived here from Canada to confer with the British Government on the question of defensive works, which are to be carried on jointly by the imperial and Canadian authorities in British Columbia.

It appears that two plans for strengthening the defences of Esquimault have been submitted, and the British general's visit to London is mainly for the purpose of deciding the point as to which plan shall be accepted.
