ment, and a check was established to secure accuracy in the transcript and to ascertain the quantity of work done before payment should be made. There are now 35 volumes of this valuable collection deposited on the shelves in the vaults of the Department here, and about 70 volumes more in England ready for transmission; the work of copying still continues, there being altogether 233 volumes.

It is recommended that, as soon as the present work is finished, the Bouquer Collection should be next copied, a collection which was also reported on by Mr. Brymner in 1873. As the work to be done, should a sufficient annual grant be made by Parliament, would continue for some years, there being many valuable papers deposited in London, and elsewhere, advantageous arrangements could be made for its proper performance, the experience of this year having shown in what direction an improvement can be effected.

Of the military correspondence transferred to this Department by the War Office, there are now bound, and, with other documents, arranged in the fire-proof vaults, specially prepared for the reception of the historical records:—
