No. 138. Secret and Personal. Following for the Prime Minister from Minister of Justice, Begins:

Friday evening General Pope, on eve of departure for Berlin, dined with Mr. Massey and heard in conversation of your recommendation of a Secretary to the Field Marshal. He was surprised and blurted out views concerning his fitness which so alarmed his host that he phoned me to come in and hear them. Pope seemed reluctant to say much, but did state that our Washington friends had expressed similar views on two occasions when this person's possible fitness for diplomatic service was being canvassed. In view of possible embarrassment which might arise later if one recommended by you proved to be disappointing, Mr. Massey and I both urged Pope to communicate his views to you. Later I discussed this with Wrong confidentially and learned that he knew person recommended quite well from relations both in Ottawa and Washington, and, though surprised at recommendation, did not share the anxiety Pope's views might occasion. This somewhat reassured me but Pope has left and, on the whole, because of the importance of the post, I feel I should inform you how the incident arose, with some indication of what was said by both Pope and Wrong, so that you may yourself determine if further enquiry would appear desirable.
