- A. Yes.

- Q. What would you value your labor at?
- A. \$50.00 I guess.
- Q. Now the old building, what do you think that is worth?
- A. I couldn't say what it is worth, it is pretty old now.
- Q. What value would you put on it?
- A. The material that is on it is about over \$150.00 anyway.
- Q. Is the old one worth as much as the new one?
- A. Not quite but there is quite a good deal of work was put on it in the way of
- Q. What other buildings are there?
- A. Store house.
