from 60 to 80 feet high, Dominion square. bounded by St. James Cathedral, the Windsor Hotel and the Y. M. C. A. Building, covers an area of from 20 to 30 acres : Mount Royal Park, on the summit of the Mountain and which may be easily reached in a carriage or by the incline railway. Here the best of carriage routes are kept in condition at the expense of the city: its surface covers 100 arpents situated in the midst of a dense forest. Montreal is very rich in chapels, such as that of the Hotel-Dieu, with its large dome, which shelters within its walls hundreds of sick people attended by the best physicians, under the direction of the Hospitaler Nuns; Our Lady of Lourde, a perfect masterpiece of painting and sculpture; Bonsecours chapel, and Our Lady of Pity annexed to the convent of the Congregation of Our Lady are greatly renowned for the many celestial favors obtained.

Montreal has her monuments erected to the glory of her chindren who have dovoted their lives to the service of their country, such as that of Sir John A. Macdonal, Maisonneuve, Dr Chenier who died on the Lattlefield for the liberty of his follow countrymen—a liberty guaranteed by our Constitution; that of her Majesty Queen Victoria; I shall no more than montion that of Nelson on Jacques-Cartier square, he being considered a stranger to this country.

Two Electric Street Railway Companies provide first class transportation for the citizens. There are at least 250 miles of railroad, and more than 300 cars are regularly operated in the principal streets giving an average 3 minute service.

Go through the private residential streets, such as St. Denis, Cherrier, Lafontaine Park, St. Hubert, Sherbrooke, Beaver Hall; through Westmount and the western avenues of the city; Union avenue,
