

- Nottingham* (of which he is Superintendent), in the Downs at that date, having left Halifax on the 18th October, 1778. 1779
- 39 **Sir Guy Carleton's Return of Officers.** This is a complete "List of Garrison Officers in America: Sent from the War Office Returned with Remarks by Sir Guy Carleton, dated New York, 30th October, 1782." The Return bears the autograph signature of Sir "Guy Carleton." The list includes the officers at St. Augustine, Florida, and in South Carolina, Nova Scotia, Newfoundland, Cape Breton, St. John's Island, Province and Bermuda. 1782
- Sir Guy Carleton, born in 1724, served with Wolfe at Quebec; became Governor-General in 1774. In 1782 he succeeded Sir H. Clinton as Commander-in-Chief in North America, and in 1786 was made Lord Dorchester. He was in Canada 26 years. His signature is genuine.
- 40 **Original Letter of Capt. G. A. Byron** to the Board of Ordnance, dated 10th Aug't, 1784, asking that an armourer be appointed to the *Druid*, which he commands. The request was complied with by Sir Guy Carleton, who signed the order of appointment, on the 31st August, 1784, with his own initials, "G. C." 1784
- 41 **Original Letter of Capt. G. A. Byron** to the Board of Ordnance, dated 5th of Oct., 1784, stating that as the armourer appointed in August failed to join the ship, Thomas Atkins be appointed in his place. Ordered by Sir Guy Carleton on the 15th Oct., 1784, by signing his own initials, "G. C." as before. 1784
- 42 **"Lord Keppel's Paper** relative to Lord Albemarle's Irish Concerns." The endorsement states that it is "touching several matters that he desires Mr. Bradfield would enquire into," etc. With Mr. Sharpe's remarks. The document is dated in July, 1786. 1786
- Lord Keppel was guardian to Lord Albemarle.
- 43 **Lord Dorchester's Original Signed Warrant** for £508 6s. 8d. Dated "Quebec, 9th July, 1787." 1787
- 44 **Lord Dorchester's Original Signed Warrant** for £514 8s. 8d. Dated "Quebec, 19th Nov., 1787." 1787
- 45 **Lord Dorchester's Original Signed Warrant** for £623 16s. Dated "Quebec, 22nd Nov., 1787." 1787
- 46 **Lord Dorchester's Original Signed Warrant** for £596 15s. 8d. Dated "Quebec, 24th December, 1787." 1787
- 47 **Original Memorial of Capt. McCinnis** to Sir George Yonge, Secretary at War, dated Topsam, 26th June, 1790, praying that for his services (being also wounded and a prisoner at Ticonderoga) he be appointed Captain of "Invalids, or to other service." 1790
- Yonge Street Toronto, and a township in the Province were named by Gov. Simcoe after his friend, Sir G. Yonge.
- 48 **Original Memorial of Captain Burns** to Sir George Yonge, dated "Pall Mall, August 3rd, 1790," praying that for raising the Royal Fencible Regiment and for his 30 years' service (being only on half pay) he be granted, as Captain, "a Company of Invalids, or Governor of the Garrison at Placencia," etc. 1790
- 49 **Original Memorial to the King** of Captain McCrea, dated "Nector Castle, 30th Oct., 1790," praying that for his long service, his privations, and many wounds, he be made Governor of Plymouth, or Captain of Cowes Castle. 1790
- 50 **Original Memorial to the King** of Colonel Peter Craig, dated London, Dec. 1st, 1790, praying that being the only officer remaining of the services of the Siege of Gibraltar, he receive "some mark of the King's favor," etc. 1790
- 51 **Memorial to Sir George Yonge** of Lieut. Fredk. Philippe Robinson, of the 38th Regiment (without date) praying for some additional appointment, he having served "14 years as a subaltern, and almost during the whole War in America, and was 18 months a prisoner with the Americans." 1791
- This Memorial was that of Lieutenant (afterwards Sir) Frederick Philippe Robinson, Lieut. Governor of Upper Canada in 1814-15. In his "History of the Loyalists of America," Rev. Dr. Ryerson, on page 199 of the second volume, recounts the services of Lieut.-General Sir F. P. Robinson. He served in the war of 1812, and remained in Upper Canada afterwards as Governor. He was the son of Colonel Beverley Robinson, formerly of Virginia, and was a relative of Sir John Beverley Robinson, Chief Justice of Upper Canada.
- 52 **Letter to the Secretary at War** of John Cole Bowen, dated the 3rd of Feb'y., 1791, and requesting an answer to a memorial which he had sent to the War Office, praying for an appointment as Lieut., in room of one of the officers that had got a company. 1791
- 53 **Proxies of Members of the House of Lords.** Proxy in Latin, of Lord Fortescue to Lord Graham, to act for him, as his true, certain and undoubted Agent, Attorney, etc. with full power and authority to act for him and his name, in all things, business, etc., to be considered and decided in Parliament, to give advice, counsel, even to sign his name with such power as he himself might have, etc. 1792
- Autograph signature of Lord "Fortescue."
- 54 The Same Form filled up by the Duke of Bedford in favour of Lord de Thanel to act for him as proxy. 1810
- Autograph signature of the Duke of "Bedford."
- 55 The Same Form filled up by Lord Conyngham, authorizing Lord Keith to act for him as proxy. 1811
- Autograph signature of Lord "Conyngham."
- 56 The Same Form filled up by Lord Hillsborough in favour of the Duke of Sussex to act as his proxy. 1815
- Autograph signature of Lord "Hillsborough."
- 57 The Same Form filled up by Lord Charlemont in favour of Lord Holland as his proxy. 1819
- Autograph signature of Lord "Charlemont."
