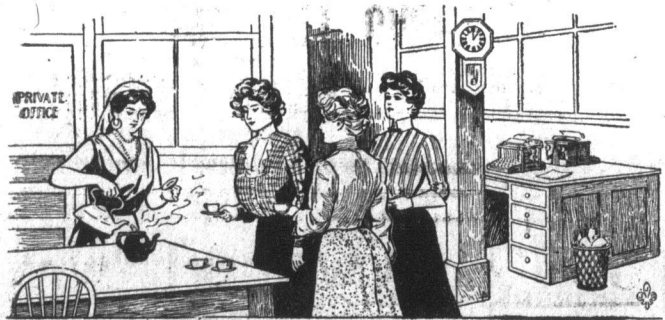
NEW BUSINESS

POPE NOT SELECTED

Two Ballots Have Been Taken, But Without Decisive Result.

Rome, Aug. 3.—No successor to Leo XIII. has yet been chosen. Two ballots were taken for Pope on Saturday, but both were without result. The first ballot was taken about 11.20 this morning, and the smoke from the second issued from the Sistine Chapel's chimney at 6.40 this evening. There were also two ballots yesterday.

The conclusion is drawn that the strength of the leading candidate remains unbroken, and that no compromise candidate has yet appeared. And there is no indication of how long this condition of affairs will continue. The prolongation of the contest has aroused tremendous public interest. Every trace of that apathy which followed the death of the late Pope has vanished, and instead there now exists a burning interest in everything pertaining to the election of his successor. To-night the culmination in the appearance of a great crowd which packed the square of St. Peter's, and presented a spectacle seldom seen even at the scene of so many historic ceremonies. Princes, Princes, Archbishops, Bishops, monsignors priests—in short, people from every walk in life from that of noble to street beggar—talk of nothing but the election of the Pope. The smoke from the burning ballots. Both this morning and this evening this was the lodestone which drew tens of thousands to the square of St. Peter's. There for hours, with strained eyes, they waited in the hope of seeing a tiny little stream of smoke.

The scene at St. Peter's last night was by far the most impressive that has occurred in Rome since the late Pope became ill. After the fruitless morning ballot a belief spread that a new Pontiff would surely be elected this evening. Carriages and vehicles of every description rattled into the piazza of St. Peter's. The regular Sunday leisure was forgotten in the anxiety to see the new occupant of the Holy See. The streets converging into St. Peter's became black with the thousands who entered the square with the ceaseless regularity of an incoming tide. From the barracks came large reinforcements of troops, who marched across the piazza and lined up at the foot of the steps of the Basilica, leaving only small spaces between the companies, in order to prevent a sudden rush to get into St. Peter's to witness the new Pope give his blessing to the Catholic world. A strong force of cavalry was picketed near by in case of riot. Two thousand soldiers were in the square. By 6 o'clock it was estimated that 50,000 people occupied the vast amphitheatre. Almost encircling this great audience rose the stately pillars of the colonnade, beneath which many rested and waited.

A great mass of provisions was introduced into the conclave to-day through the wicket gate. Everything was thoroughly examined before being allowed to pass through the wicket. Forty chickens were cut open to see that they did not contain contraband matter. Letters and telegrams for the Cardinals were sent in to the Camerlengo, who does as he thinks best about delivering them. Some of the Catholic newspapers were also sent in, but no non-clerical ones. The number of programs for Cardinals Herrera y Espinosa and Langenieux, who are ill, was so great that they made a large packet. The Spanish students, who are particularly anxious about the condition of Cardinal Herrera, asked Dr. Lapini through the wicket how he was, and the doctor replied that he was a little better, but still confined to his bed, and that the condition of Cardinal Cretoni was unchanged. It is understood that the latter did not wish to participate in the conclave, but was almost forced to do so. He is now filled with doubts as to whether he should give a vote, being afflicted with a sort of mania that he is unworthy to interpret the divine will by casting his vote for anyone.

SHOT ON A STREET CAR.

Grand Treasurer of the Oddfellows Murdered by Highwaymen.

Spokane, Wash., Aug. 1.—John Kreinhubler, Treasurer of the Grand Lodge of Oddfellows of this State, was shot by a masked highwayman on a street car last night. Five desperadoes entered the car and ordered the passengers to throw up their hands. Mr. Kreinhubler resisted and the shooting followed. The robbers secured about \$200 from the eleven passengers and escaped.

TELEGRAPHIC BREVITIES.

Disturbances are reported in Armenia similar to those of 1894.

A serious shortage of sheep in New Zealand will interfere with Premier Seddon's meat shop scheme.

Mrs. Samuel Parker, wife of the wealthiest man in Hawaii, was robbed of \$80,000 worth of diamonds.

Russian writers complain that they have made no progress in China because of the resourcefulness of the Japanese.

Count Tolstoy writes that revolution by force has become impossible under the technical improvements of modern government.

Three men were killed, another is missing and a fifth was dangerously hurt in a freight wreck on the Wabash at Pony Creek crossing, seventeen miles south of Council Bluffs, Iowa.

The threatened order for a general lockout of the building trades was issued at Chicago by the Builders' Exchange League. It is believed that it will take away employment from 25,000 men.

The third trial of former Secretary of State Caleb Powers, as accessory before the fact to the murder of Gov. Goebel, will begin to-day. Powers has been convicted twice, and sentenced for life both times.

The Governor-General's Foot Guards, the 2nd Ottawa Field Battery and the Ottawa Company of Canadian Engineers, under command of Lieut.-Col. A. L. Jarvis, and accompanied by their own band and bugle corps, in all about 500 strong, are visiting Pittsburgh, N.Y.
