A gentleman visiting in Lindsay from the North-west kindly handed the Rector \$5 for Christmas cheer for the needy of our parish.

Twenty-one thousand persons were killed in India by snake bites, while 2,800 were killed by wild animals, within a year, while ninety-thousand head of cattle were destroyed. On the other hand fifteen thousand wild beasts were killed and 130,000 deadly snakes. Southern countries have some disadvantages and we are glad we live in Canada.

Last year alone the Church in Uganda sent over \$4,000 to England for bibles and portions of the Scripture, and the native church is now supporting one hundred native teachers and has many more in training, and that in the land where a few years ago Stanley, the explorer, found all in darkness and challenged the Christian Church to send missionaries.
