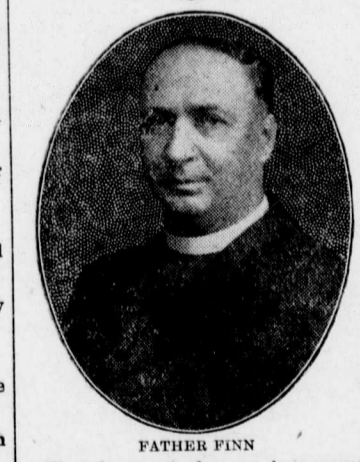
THE MASTER'S VOICE

The authors have used up a great amount of material which might have been diluted into many pages. It is a book that may be enjoyed for its own sake, or as a book of reference, and it makes in every part of it a for thinking and a for reading. THE TRAIL OF THE DRAGON and Other Stories, by Marion F. Nixon Roue and other leading Catholic authors. A volume of stories which make very interesting and readable reading for young and old. MARCELA GRACE, by Rosa Mulholland. The plot of this story is laid with a skill and grasp of details not always found in novels of the day, while its development bears witness at every page to a complete mastery of the subject, joined to grace and force of diction. THE LIGHT OF HIS COUNTENANCE, by Jerome Hartie. A highly successful story. The plot is simple, the characters are natural, their conversation is sprightly and unhampered, and there is a touch of genuine comedy to lighten the tragic drama. HER JOURNALS' END, by Frances Cooke. A story of a young man's struggle, of petty jealousy, and of sublime devotion. AGATHA HARRY SAYING, by Rosa Mulholland. A novel that depicts to us a wide world of suffering and of love. BOND AND FREE, by Jean Connor. A new story by an author who knows how to write a splendidly strong book. THE CIRCUS RIDER'S DAUGHTER, by F. von Stryker. A historical novel—a love story—every reader will feel better for having read. CONNOR DARCY'S STRUGGLES, by W. M. Bebb. A novel that depicts to us a wide world of suffering and of love. FABIOLA, by Cardinal Newman. This edition of Cardinal Newman's tale of early Christian times is much more modern and decidedly more attractive than the old edition. FABIOLA'S SISTERS, Adapted by A. C. Clarke. This is a companion volume and a sequel to FABIOLA. FORGIVE AND FORGET, by Ernest Lingens. A sweet and wholesome love story, showing the power of a truly simple and honest devotion. THE HEIRESS OF CROENSTEIN, by Countess Haha-Haha. An exquisite story of love and gold, told in a simple and direct manner. IDOLS: or The Secret of the Rue Chausse d'Antin, by Raoul de Navey. The story is a remarkably clever and well constructed and evinces a master hand. IN GOD'S GOOD TIME, by H. M. Ross. This is a story that grips the heart in the liveliest sympathy for what is human and good. THE MONK'S PARDON, by Raoul de Navey. An historical romance of the time of King Philip IV. of Spain. MY LADY BEATRICE, by Frances Cooke. The story of a society girl's development through the love of a strong man. It is vivid in characterization, and intense in interest. THE OTHER MISS LISLE, by M. C. Martin. A powerful story of South African life. It is largely strong and full of action, and contains a great deal of masterly characterization. THE OUTLAW OF CAMARGUE, by A. de Lamotte. This is a capital novel with plenty of "go" in it. ROSE OF THE WORLD, by M. C. Martin. A very sweet and tender story, and will appeal to the reader through these qualities. SO AS BY FIRE, by Jean Connor. After living with a man that was a lie, the heroine of this story renounces it all that she might stoop for the great wrong she has done. A really absorbing and profitable story. THE TEST OF COURAGE, by H. M. Ross. A story that grips the heart, and the well constructed plot, the breezy dialogue, the clear, rapid style, carry the reader away. THE SHADOW OF EVERSLIGH, by Jane Lansdowne. It is a weird tale, blending not a little of the supernatural with various stirring and exciting incidents. THE TEMPEST OF THE HEART, by Mary Agatha Gray. A story of deep feeling that centers around a young monk's mission. THE SECRET OF THE GREEN VASE, by Frances Cooke. The story is one of high ideals and strong characters. 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
