Then there is the word "acrodrome", semetimes used in speaking of the wachine; sometimes in speaking of the shed in which the machine is housed; and sometimes in connection with the imaginary track on which the machine travels. It is an easy matter to trace the origin of each of the above applications of the word and it may be said that there is seecthing to argue in favor of each.

However it may be, one thing is certain; that in order to converse intelligibly on the subject of Aviation we must cut our technical words down to one and only one meaning. I think most of us will agree that the following sentence would be semewhat misleading.

> "The doors of the Aerodrome were opened and the aerodrome was wheeled over to the Aerodrome".
