Mildmay and Carrick Separated by Special Act of Parliament.

ELECTION ON MAY 8TH.

By a special Act of Legislature, introduced by W. D. Cargill, M. P. P. for South Bruce, the village of Mildmay has become incorporated. The matter came up in the House on Tuesday morning, when a deputation of four, comprised of Messrs. L. Doering, W. G. Helwig, D. Robertson and R. McNamara, represen-
