

powers involved in the war. The President has sent the following message to King George, Emperor William, Emperor Nichlas, Emperor Francis-Joseph, and President Poincare:
"As official head of one of the

powers signatory to The Hague convention, I feel it to be my privilege and my duty under article three of that convention to say to you in a spirit of most earnest friendship, that I should welcome an opportunity to act in the interest of European peace either now or any other time that might be thought to be more susceptible, as an occasion to serve you and all concerned in a way that would afford me lasting cause for gratitude and happiness."
